COVINGTON, LA., Oct. 9, 1882.

The Police Jury met on the above date. Present—J. M. Allison, M. Burns, R. Galatas, W. B. Rogers, W. E. Parker, P. Welch, Chas. Aubry, M. H. Cray, A. Cousin. Absent—J. W. Smith.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. Galatas moved that all warrants be paid by the Treasurer according to their numbers. Carried.

The report of Mr. F. A. Guyol, appointed to examine the books of Mr. J. O. Poole, late Parish Treasurer, which has already been published and referred to Mr. Jos. A. Reid, Parish Attorney, for action.

Mr. F. A. Guyol then presented the following:
COVINGTON, LA., Oct. 9, 1882.

To the honorable President and members of the Police Jury:

Gentlemen—In accordance with a resolution passed at your last meeting, I have the honor to report that after a careful examination of the books of W. B. Cook, Sheriff and Ex-Officio Tax Collector of the Parish of St. Tammany, and comparing them with the books of Mr. J. O. Poole, Ex-Parish Treasurer, I have found the books of Mr. Cook all correct.

On motion, the report was received and adopted.

Mr. W. C. Warren, Parish Treasurer, stated that his warrants for his salary for the first, second and third quarters, Nos. 253, 254 and 255, for \$25 each, had become mislaid, and asked that duplicate warrants be issued to him. Granted.

Mr. Galatas offered the following:
Resolved, That the Tax Collector be forbidden from receiving witnesses' warrants in payment for parish taxes or incenses, and that the Secretary furnish the Tax Collector with a copy of this resolution. Adopted.

On motion, Mr. Ed. R. Doyle was assigned to work on the lower end of the Bogue Chitto road.

On motion of Mr. Burns, the game law was amended so as to read as follows, in accordance with the State law adopted at the last session of the General Assembly:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, That it shall be unlawful in this parish to catch, kill, or pursue with such intent, any wild duck, deer or fawn, or to have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, between the first day of March and the first day of October of each year, under a penalty of not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty dollars for each offense.

SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That it shall be unlawful in this parish to catch, kill, or pursue with such intent, or have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, any wild turkey, between the fifteenth day of April and the first day of October, in each year, under a penalty of not less than ten nor more than twenty dollars for each offense.

SEC. 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That no person shall catch, kill, or pursue with such intent, or have the same in possession after it has been caught or killed, any quail, partridge or pheasant, between the first day of April and the first day of October, in each year, under a penalty of not less than ten nor more than twenty-five dollars for each offense.

On motion, the resolution fining members five dollars for non-attendance at the meetings of the Police Jury, was abolished.

A petition signed by citizens of the Second Ward, for a public road leading from the Lee Ferry road, at Mrs. Goodby's, to Semiloca, was laid over till next meeting.

The President stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of appointing Clerks of Election, to act at the Congressional election on the 7th of November next.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Tangipahoa.

It is hereby ordered that the rule of Court, rendered April 6, 1880, be and the same is hereby amended, as follows: From and after July first, 1882, the terms of Court of the several parishes composing the Eighteenth Judicial District shall commence on the following dates:

Parish of Washington.

Jury terms—Tuesday after the second Monday in March, and Tuesday after the fourth Monday in October. Court terms—Tuesday after the second Monday in April, and Tuesday after the fourth Monday in November.

Jury terms—Fourth Monday in March and second Monday in October. Court terms—Fourth Monday in May and third Monday in December.
