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Sand Bags a Blessing.

The sand bag is invaluable in the sick room. Get some clean, fine sand, dry it thoroughly in a kettle on the stove. Make a bag about eight inches square of flannel, fill it with dry sand, sew the opening carefully together and cover the bag with cotton or linen. This will prevent the sand from sifting out, and will also enable you to heat the bag quickly by placing it in the oven or even on top of the stove. After once using this you will never again attempt to warm the feet or hands of a sick person with a bottle of hot water or a brick. The sand holds the heat a long time, and the bag can be tucked up to the back without hurting the invalid. It is a good plan to make two or three of the bags and keep them on hand, ready for use at any time when needed.

Why the Year 1900 will Not be a Leap Year.

The following explanation will show you why the year 1900 will not be counted among leap years: The year is 365 days, 5 hours and 46 minutes long; 11 minutes are taken every year 365 1/4 long, and every fourth year has an extra day. This was Julius Caesar's arrangement, as I explained in "Notes for the Curious" in the Republican of August 24. You may ask: "Where do these 11 minutes come from?" They come from the future, and are paid by omitting leap year every 100 years; but if leap year is omitted regularly every one hundred years it is found that the 11 minutes taken each year will not only have been paid back, but that a whole day will have been given up. So Pope Gregory XIII., who improved on Caesar's calendar in 1582, decreed that every centennial year divisible by four should be leap year after all. So we borrow 11 minutes each year more than paying our borrowing back by omitting three leap years in three centennial years, and square matters by having a leap year in the fourth centennial year. Pope Gregory's arrangement is so exact and the borrowing and paying back balanced so nicely that we borrow more than we pay back to the extent of only one day in 3,899 years.—Ex.

PARISH LICENSES.

AN ACT To levy, collect and enforce payment of an annual license tax upon all persons, association of persons, and corporations pursuing any trade, profession, vocation, calling or business in the parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, except those who are expressly exempt from such tax by Articles 206 and 207 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana: Section 1. Be it enacted by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, that there is hereby levied an annual license tax for the calendar year A. D. 1890, and for each subsequent year, upon each person, association of persons or corporation, pursuing any trade, profession, vocation, calling or business in the parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, except those expressly exempt from such tax by Articles 206 and 207 of the State Constitution. Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the parish licenses shall be upon the same trades, occupations and professions, and for the same amounts as the State licenses. Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That the Tax Collector be and he is hereby instructed to collect all parish licenses on or before the first day of April of each year; all parish licenses not paid by the above date to be turned over to the Parish Attorney for collection.
