The Most Rev. Archbishop Janzen will give confirmation in Boufouca on Friday, April 29, and the day following at Slidell, where a mission conducted by Rev. Downe, S. F. will begin Sunday, April 24th. The evening train of Saturday, the 30th inst., will bring the Archbishop to Covington. He will say holy mass on Sunday, May 1st in the old church, at 7 a. m., the last holy sacrifice performed in the time-honored building. At half-past 10 after the arrival of the train with friends from the city, the new large bell will call to the new church, where the dedication and benediction will take place, in the following order: A procession formed by the Archbishop, clergy and laity, preceded by the cross, will wind around the building with song and prayers. Entering the church, the litany of All Saints will be intoned, and blessing of wells continued all around till the Archbishop arrives in front of the main altar and blesses it with appropriate prayers. The corner-stone is meanwhile dedicated and immured. The first high mass will be changed, and his Grace will preach at the time of the gospel reading, different prayers recited, and the whole ceremony concluded with the benediction of the Archbishop. We are informed that three cannons are on the road, coming to roar out the glad tidings, and that after God's praise has been chanted, kind ladies will be in readiness to refresh the inner man with substantial food and drink.


