**REGULATIONS FOR LENT.**

The following are the Lenten regulations to be followed in this diocese:

1. Every day in Lent, except Sundays, is a fasting day of obligation.
2. The use of flesh meats is allowed at the principle meal on all days except Wednesdays and Fridays, and except Saturday the Ember day and Saturday of Holy Week.
3. Those who are dispensed from fasting may eat flesh meat at every meal on days when meat is allowed.
4. Flesh meat and fish are not allowed to be used at the same meal, not even on Sunday.
5. Only one full meal in the day, after mid-day or near it, is allowed.
6. A small collation may be taken in the evening, at which fish, butter, milk and eggs are allowed. When the principle meal cannot be taken at mid-day, the order may be reversed and the collation may be taken in the morning, the principal meal in the evening. In the preparation of food the use of lard is allowed.
7. In the morning the drinking of coffee, tea or chocolate is not forbidden; but there is no permission to eat, unless it be so little that the law is not presumed to notice it.
8. The law of abstinence from meat is binding on all from the age of seven years, unless exempted by reason of ill-health or necessity.
9. All persons twenty-one years of age are bound to fast, unless lawfully exempted. It is advisable, in case of doubt, to consult the confessor.
