The judicial sale in the case of J. D. Peet vs. The Slidell Brick and Tile Manufacturing Co., took place at the Courthouse last Saturday, to satisfy a judgment of \$7500 and costs and attorney fees. The property was bought by the plaintiff, J. D. Peet, for the sum of \$9800.

**FATAL ACCIDENT.**

Last Sunday evening, George Mendow, the fourteen year old son of Mr. Robert Mendow, who lives about five miles from Covington, accidentally shot and killed himself with a pistol. During the absence of his parents, who were away on a visit to some neighbors, young Mendow, who was entertaining several of his young friends, went to get something off of a shelf, when he came across a pistol belonging to his father. He took it up, with the muzzle pointing toward him, when it suddenly exploded, the ball striking him in the forehead, killing him almost instantly. This is one of the most deplorable accidents that it has been our painful duty to record, and the sorrowing parents have the universal sympathy of the community in their sudden and sad affliction. The funeral took place Monday evening and was largely attended. Mr. Mendow requests us to express his sincere thanks to his friends and neighbors for their kind sympathy and assistance in his hour of distress.

**A GOOD CAPTURE.**

**THIEVES IN THE CALABOOSE.**

On Friday, the 16th inst., Deputy Sheriff J. E. Gaines, of Pearl River, cleverly captured a desperate fugitive who is wanted on the charge of murder. The prisoner is a negro, about 40 years old, by the name of Demegre Moses, and he is considered one of the most brutal rascals that has ever occurred in this parish. The killing took place about two years ago, at Dorville, Moses's store, in Bayou LaCombe. Demegre Moses was fighting with a man named John O'Bannon, and was attacking him with a knife. He lit Moses on the face. At the last moment of court the grand jury found a bill against him for murder. He has been awaiting arrest by being in the celebrated Honey Creek swamp, a well-known haunt for fugitives from justice. He was across the state line at the time the killing took place, but was caught by a conversation by Deputy Sheriff Gaines to come over to where he was standing. He immediately crossed him with his hands and compelled him to surrender, which he did. He was lodged in the parish jail at Covington last Friday night. Deputy Sheriff Gaines, who is one of the best officers for the parish, showed credit for his manner in which he made the arrest, and has no doubt beyond a doubt that he is one of the best men for the place, and we would do his duty in arresting the most desperate criminal.
