yesterday and gave it a thorough clean-  
ing in honor of Easter.

We are glad to announce that Mr.  
Ferry Burrell is convalescing, and we  
hope to see him out again before many  
days.

A severe wind and rain storm visited  
our town last Monday night. No harm  
done that we have heard of, except a  
few scores.

We learn that Sheriff Stroble has  
purchased the Scullin place, about two  
miles from Covington, and will make  
that his home.

New comers are constantly arriving,  
and soon all the vacant places will be  
taken. As a summer resort, Covington  
takes the Easter egg.

mail train now reaches here before

nesday excursions begin?

This is the last day for sending in  
bids for the new iron bridge at Coving-  
ton. We understand that Mr. Abney  
has received several bids for this work.

enterprising livery stable men, have re-

vehicles, in preparation for the summer  
season.

To-morrow will be Easter Sunday, the  
anniversary of the day which saw the  
resurrection of Christ. It will be cele-  
brated with gladness and songs of re-  
joicing.

How to keep fresh eggs from spoiling

**GAME LAW.**—The law for the pro-  
tection of deer, wild turkeys, partridges  
and ducks will go into effect on Sunday,  
the 15th of April, and remain in force  
until the 15th of October. Hunters will  
do well to make a note of this, if they  
wish to avoid violating the law.

as being the guilty party. At the same  
time we think it would have been much  
better to have prosecuted him according  
to law.

The Police Jury, at its last meeting,  
instructed the Clerk of Court to "carry  
the hookcase upstairs." Nothing is  
said about his employing any help, and  
the hookcase is a very heavy piece of  
furniture for one man to carry up the  
windy stairs. When he undertakes  
the job we want to be there to hear  
what he has to say to himself while he  
is about it.

is to be opened in a few weeks. This is  
a valuable acquisition, and will result

where to secure an education. On  
the contrary, others would gladly  
come here for that purpose.

Mr. J. J. Dunn has been ap-  
pointed Deputy Sheriff at J.  
Demourelle's brickyard. This will  
tend to preserve the peace among  
the negroes, who have become very  
violent in that vicinity. Mr. Dunn  
is a very capable man, and his ap-  
pointment, by Sheriff Stroble, will  
meet with the general approval of  
the public.

row, March 25, Rev. W. C.  
Black, D. D., editor of the New  
Orleans Christian Advocate, will  
officiate, and preach at 11 A. M.
