COUNCIL HALL, COVINGTON, LA., Oct. 2, 1894.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on the above date. Present—Adolph Frederick, Mayor; Dr. C. Z. Williams, S. D. Anderson, Hardy H. Smith, J. A. Parry. Absent—A. Laborde, L. Roublon.

The minutes of last meeting were read and approved. A communication was received from Mrs. C. L. Smith, showing that there was still a balance due of \$31 00 on the piano for the Town Hall.

On motion, duly seconded, the Mayor was authorized to draw a warrant for the sum of \$31 00, in payment of the balance due on the Town Hall piano.

On motion, a vote of thanks was extended to Mrs. C. L. Smith, for her public spirit, enterprise and zealous efforts, which resulted in raising the amount of \$425 00, less the sum of \$31 00 for the purchase of the Town Hall piano.
