the regular grades.

In a short time I will start a night
class for much older boys who have



ORDINANCE

Be it ordained, by the Police
Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany,
Louisiana, That a new public place is hereby
ordered in the Eighth Ward of this
parish, at Pearl River Station, in
addition to the one at Gause's
store, and the precinct at Gause's
store is hereby designated as Precinct
No. 1 of the Eighth Ward,
and the one at Pearl River Station
as Precinct No. 2 of the Eighth
Ward, and the road known as the
Morgan's Bluff road, running from
Morgan's Bluff, on Pearl River, to
Slidell, is hereby declared to be the
dividing line between these two
precincts, and all persons living on
the lower side of said road shall vote
at Gause's store, and all those
living on the upper side of said road
shall vote at Pearl River Station;
and it is hereby ordered that poll
books and boxes be furnished accord-
ingly.

ORDINANCE

1. Be it enacted, by the Police
Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany,
Louisiana, That there be and is
hereby levied, for the year A. D.
1895, a tax of seven mills upon the
dollar upon all taxable property in
the parish.
2. Be it further enacted and etc.,
That two mills is hereby appropri-
ated therefrom for criminal ex-
penses, and two mills for the bene-
fit of Public Schools, and three
mills for the general expenses of
the parish, and that the Sheriff and
ex-officio Tax Collector do collect
the amount appropriated therefrom
for Criminal Expenses, and certify
thereof to the Police Jury, and for the
benefit of the Public Schools, upon
all property in this parish subject
to taxation including that situated
in the incorporated towns of Cov-
ington and Mandeville.
3. Be it further enacted and etc.,
That the Sheriff and ex-officio Tax
Collector shall receive, in payment
of parish taxes, (the amount appro-
priated for Public Schools excepted,) the duly approved certifi-
cates of Grand and Petit Jurors for
per diem and mileage, and certain
members of the Police
Jury for per diem and mileage,
and that be proceed with the col-
lection of the taxes now levied ac-
cording to law.
