The new crop of calendars, for the year 1897, are making their appearance.

Cotton has been severely injured in this parish by the long drouth, and the crop will be a small one.

Cold Comfort.—It is a noticeable fact that Covington never experiences such extremely hot weather, nor as much of it, before the ice factory was built, as we have had since then.
