Go And Register.

Some time ago we undertook to explain to our people who it is that must now register under Section 5 of the new constitution in order for them to be able to vote, and though we copied the law and made it as plain and simple as a-b-c, still we find an erroneous idea prevailing, and some believe that because they registered last year they need not register again. Now hear us. It makes no difference if you have registered forty thousand times previous to May 1st of this year, if you cannot write your name or do not own \$300 worth of assessable property, and you do not register before the first day of September, 1898, then you will never be able to cast another vote as long as you live. Do you understand that?

Well says one, a certain fellow told us that if we registered in 1897 that was sufficient, and as he was an intelligent fellow and a high official he ought to know. Well, he was honestly mistaken, and now let us urge upon you once more to come and get registered. The time is very short and let those who read the Echo explain this matter to their neighbors who do not take it and urge them to come and register. Some men may be able to write their name but could never fill out the blank as it must be under the new law. Such persons had better register under Section 5.—St. Helena Echo.

A raw egg with the yolk broken, in a glass of wine, is beneficial for constipation.
