AN ORDINANCE. Granting the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Company, its agents, transferees, representatives, successors or assigns, the right to erect, construct, maintain and operate along, through, over and under the streets, alleys and highways of Covington, La., a telephone or telegraph line, or lines, for the purpose of conveying intelligence and communicating by electricity, and carrying on its business by such means within, to, and from Covington, La.

Be It Ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana: Section 1. That the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Company, its agents, transferees, representatives, successors or assigns, be and are hereby granted the right to erect, construct, maintain and operate, along, through, over and under the streets, alleys and highways of Covington, Louisiana, a telephone or telegraph line or lines, for the purpose of carrying on its business and conveying and communicating intelligence and messages by electricity within, to, and from Covington, La., provided that the construction of the proposed line be commenced within sixty days from the date of this ordinance.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, That this Ordinance shall become effective and binding, upon the written acceptance of the terms herein contained, by the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, For good and sufficient cause, That this ordinance take effect and be in force, from and after the written acceptance of the terms herein specified by the Cumberland Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Section 4. The right is reserved, by the Town Council, to amend the above Ordinance at any time.

Section 5. That the Town Council shall have control of the location and height of the poles, and when any material damage is done by said Telephone Company, said Company shall be responsible for said damages.
