For the Benefit of the Families of the Officers Murdered by the Negro Robt. Charles. The Dramatic Club, organized by a younger set of society girls will give an entertainment at the Castle Hall, on

Friday, August 31, 1900, for the benefit of the orphans of the officers who so nobly fell during the late riot in New Orleans while endeavoring to capture the murderer Charles.

A Cordial Invitation. A special to the Picasyne from Boston, dated July 30th, announces that the negroes of Boston held a meeting in St. Paul's Episcopal church of that city, and threatened to send a force to clean out New Orleans. Over \$3000 was raised to send a secret agent to equip the crusaders of the Charles type in New Orleans.

Incendiary speeches were made by a Miss Jewett, called the "white negro," who said that 150,000 Congo negroes are ready to come over and annihilate the white people.

A Rev. Mr. Ferris said that they are ready to fight as Charles did; if Charles could hold 20,000 whites at bay, what might he expect of 10,000 negroes? There has been one war for the negro, said the Rev. Ferris, and there will be another, more bloody, to keep them free.

The meeting broke up amidst great excitement. Following in the wake of this demonstration, a negro ex-pugilist named Baker attempted to murder the Chief of Police at Battle Creek, Mich., out of sympathy for the negro Charles.

A number of citizens who read the above accounts have authorized us to offer free transportation to any Boston negro or negroes willing to annihilate anyone, with the understanding that they shall pass through Baton Rouge and St. Gabriel on their way down. A number of persons hope that the ex-pugilist will canvass the city in the interest of their fund, and no doubt the citizens of Tangipahoa would be pleased to entertain them for a short spell in case they should travel in these parts.

The Boston incident is full of import, and persons who remember the scenes in Boston and other abolitionist centers just previous to the civil war, find a striking similarity in the now and then, even though many treat it as an amusing affair.—Baton Rouge Truth.

MISS JEWETT COMING. Boston, Mass., Aug. 5.—Miss Lillian Clayton Jewett, the pro-negro agitator once more in the public eye because of her threat to invade the south with a negro army, is busy arranging for another trip south. She says she does not fear violence, but as a matter of precaution she will have a body guard of six stalwart negroes, who, heavily armed, are expected to protect her from all harm.

In an interview to-day she said she had no feeling against the people of the south. She says she feels hurt by the evident lack of gratitude of the southern whites.

"The greatest difficulty I have," she says, "is to teach the colored people that they must not strive to fight those wrongs against them by rising against the whites and destroying them." I teach them that they must not set an eye for eye and a tooth for tooth.

A reporter of the Picasyne notified the members of the Green Turtles Club of the receipt of the above dispatch. "All right," exclaimed a dozen voices in unison, "the Green Turtles Club will act as a reception committee. We will be at the Elipolito. We will especially be pleased to receive those six stalwart ones."

The club says the original resolutions sent to Miss Jewett were the nature of a joke, but that it is now ready to back up the joke with dead earnest, if necessary.

If we are to have our women folk terrorized by such, it is high time for all decent people to avoid the Parish. My wife is already weary, and says she is afraid to go out driving without a protector. I write and send you the copy, as I deem you a conservator of peace, and interested in the prosperity and welfare of the parish. I leave it to you to make any use you may see fit of it. We do not wish society, but such actions should be "slipped in the hat." I have written to the Sheriff about it. I refer you to Mr. H. G. Parnall, Sup't. of E. L. R. S. as to who I am. I am accustomed to the "New Orleans Booth," and I am sure that the cowardly cars know this. PUBLIC ROAD ORDINANCE. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, That the public road ordinance adopted at the January meeting, 1899, be amended so as to read as follows:

In accordance with Articles 291, 292, 293 and 294 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, the Parish of St. Tammany is hereby created a road district, and in order to work the public roads of said parish, besides the road taxes and vehicle licenses as hereinafter provided and set aside, there shall be imposed a per capita tax on each able bodied male inhabitant of the parish, between the ages of 18 and 55, which tax shall be paid to the Sheriff, who will receipt the person for the same.

That the Police Jury member from each Ward shall hire road overseers for their respective Wards, whose duty it shall be to summon each and every person, between the ages of 18 and 55, who are subject to the per capita tax, ten days notice to work the public road, to meet at a designated place.

If he show to the overseer his per capita tax receipt, he shall be excused from work on the public road for a period of two days, and in default of producing his per capita tax receipt from the Sheriff, or payment to the overseer, or working two days, as herein provided, the person shall be fined in a sum of not less than \$5 00 or more than \$15 00, and in default of the payment of the fine and costs, he shall be imprisoned in the parish jail for a period not to exceed 30 days. Said prosecution to be conducted before the District Court.

ORDINANCE. Forbidding Obstruction to Bridges. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, La., That all persons are hereby forbidden to place any boom or obstruction across the creeks, bayous and rivers of this parish, within a distance of two miles above the public bridges.

2. That any person or persons guilty of obstructing or interfering with the free passage of any creek, bayou and river as above said, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and be fined in a sum of not less than \$10 or more than \$100, and in default of payment of the fine, shall be imprisoned in the parish jail for a period not to exceed 3 months.
