Worth Rather than Ro-  
tation in Office.  
About the only argument, if ar-  
gument it may be called, that we  
have heard or seen urged against  
the re-nomination of S. M. Robert-  
son for congress, is the fact that he  
has already had the position for  
about fourteen years. Now, to the  
mind of the writer, that is just why  
he should be returned. In many  
states of the Union, when a repre-  
sentative or senator proves true to his  
party and to his constituents, he is  
kept in congress just as long as he  
will stay, or until he is defeated by  
the other party. That is why the  
southern states have so many  
able and influential men in con-  
gress. No man can do efficient  
work for his people in one or two  
terms, unless he is endowed with  
almost superhuman ability, and  
can command the attention of  
congress at the start. There are  
few men that do this; but it takes  
years of careful observation and ex-  
perience with most men. The men  
who have accomplished the most  
are those who have been veterans  
in the service. You are more apt  
to accept suggestions of reform from  
a tried and true public servant,  
than from one who has had no  
experience in public affairs. Just  
so it is in congress. The men of  
experience in legislation are usually  
the promoters of the public good.  
Shakespeare said:

"The friends thou hast and their  
adoration tried, grapple them to thy  
soul with hooks of steel."  
So we think the people of this  
district ought to do with Sam Robert-  
son. He has been "weighed in  
the balance and not found wanting."  
His years of service in congress  
should be a strong argument in  
favor of his return. "Change not  
the old for the new," especially at  
this crisis of national affairs. Col.  
Robertson must be a man of con-  
siderable recognized worth and  
ability, or he would not be on the  
Ways and Means Committee,  
which is the most important in the  
House.—Hammond Vindicator.

DEMOCRATIC MASS  
MEETING.  
Covington, La., Sept. 5, 1900.  
The meeting was called to order  
by J. J. Cusachs, President.  
Mr. C. S. E. Babington was  
called to the chair as temporary  
Chairman and Jules B. Maille as  
temporary Secretary.  
It was moved by Mr. J. B. Lan-  
caster, seconded by Mr. J. J.  
Cusachs, that we go into permanent  
organization. Carried.  
It was moved by Mr. J. B. Lan-  
caster, seconded Mr. T. E. Brew-  
ster, that the temporary officers be  
made permanent. Carried.  
The following resolutions were  
then read by T. M. Burns:

1. That the Democrats of St.  
Tammany Parish in mass meeting,  
assembled, do ratify the nomina-  
tions of that peerless leader and  
patriot William Jennings Bryan  
for President and Adlai E. Steven-  
son for Vice President, and en-  
dorse the platform and principles  
adopted by the Kansas City con-  
vention.

2. Be it further resolved, that  
we heartily endorse the adminis-  
tration of the Hon. W. W. Heard.  
3. Be it resolved, that the ser-  
vice of the Hon. S. M. Robertson,  
in the House of Representatives,  
has been satisfactory to the people  
of St. Tammany Parish, and his  
high sense of duty to his constitu-  
ents as well as zealous endeavors  
to secure for our people appropria-  
tions for the improvements of our  
water ways, satisfy us of his fit-  
ness for the office.

4. Be it further resolved, that  
it is self evident that the people  
should have to represent them in  
Congress a thoroughly tried and ex-  
perienced Democrat, and we believe  
that in the Hon. S. M. Robertson  
we have such a man.  
5. Therefore, be it further re-  
solved, that the delegates from  
St. Tammany Parish, in the Con-  
gressional Convention, in Baton  
Rouge, on Sept. 12, A. D. 1900,

Lancaster, that the resolutions be  
adopted. Carried.

TAX ORDINANCE  
On motion of Mr. Parker, secon-  
ded by Mr. Alexins, the follow-  
ing was then adopted:  
1. Be it enacted, by the Police  
Jury of the Parish of St. Tam-  
many, Louisiana, That there be  
and is hereby levied for the year  
A. D. 1900, a tax of nine mills  
upon the dollar upon all taxable  
property in the parish.  
2. Be it further enacted, etc.,

That three mills be hereby ap-  
propriated therefrom for criminal ex-  
penses, two mills for the benefit of  
Public Schools, two mills for general  
expenses of the parish and two mills  
for the benefit of public roads; and  
that the Sheriff and ex-officio Tax  
Collector do collect the amount ap-  
propriated therefrom for Criminal  
Expenses, and for the benefit of the  
Public Schools and Public Roads,  
upon all property in the parish sub-  
ject to taxation, including that situ-  
ated in the towns of Covington and  
Mandeville.  
3. Be it further enacted, etc.,  
That the Sheriff and ex-officio Tax  
Collector shall receive, in payment  
of parish taxes, (the amount ap-  
propriated for the Public Schools ex-  
cepted,) the duly approved certifi-  
cates of the Grand and Petit Jurors  
for per diem and mileage, and cer-  
tificates of members of the Police  
Jury for per diem and mileage,  
and that he proceed with the col-  
lection of the taxes now levied  
according to law.  
Adopted August 31, 1900.  
On motion, duly seconded, it was  
decided that sealed bids be adver-  
tised for the following bridge  
work, the bids to be handed in to  
the Police Jury at its next meeting,  
Tuesday, October 9, 1900, at 9 a. m.,  
the right being reserved to reject  
any or all bids:  
The rebuilding of four bridges  
on the Military road.
