Police Jury.  
Covington, La., Oct. 9, 1900.  
The Police Jury met at the Court-  
house on the above date, pursuant  
to adjournment, and remained  
in session two days.  
Present:  
First ward—Geo. Koepf, Jr.  
Second ward—Wm. Bruhl.  
Third ward—G. C. Alexius.  
Fourth ward—J. M. Smith.  
Fifth ward—Crawford Williams.  
Sixth ward—H. Q. Parker.  
Seventh ward—John A. Todd.  
Eighth ward—John Swinson.  
Ninth ward—W. E. Gause.  
The minutes of the last meeting  
were read and adopted.  
The bids for building four bridges  
on Military road were opened and  
read, and on motion, all bids were  
rejected.  
The President appointed Messrs.  
Crawford Williams and Wm. Bruhl  
to report at the January meeting,  
1901, to measure and give a correct  
width and length of the four bridges  
to be built on the Military road.  
The petition for a public road  
leading from Sibley to Louis  
Galatas' place was laid over till  
next meeting, and Edward Dubuis-  
son, Melville Pichon and W. E.  
Gause were appointed a committee  
to lay out the road, and see the  
property owners as to the right of  
way, and report at the next meeting.  
The following

PETITION  
was then read:  
Florenville, La., Aug. 28, 1900.  
To the honorable President and mem-  
bers of the Police Jury:  
Gentlemen—We, the under-  
signed citizens of St. Tammany  
Parish, La., and road hands  
of the public road leading from  
Florenville to Madisonville, La.,  
do hereby petition your honorable  
body to allow Mr. N. G. Pearsall,  
General Manager of the East Louisi-  
ana Railroad, to change said road  
as follows to-wit: One quarter of  
a mile north-west of Florenville,  
change the road south 76 degrees  
east until the Florenville stage bears  
south 14 degrees west. At this  
point another road comes into  
Florenville. Said change is desired  
by Mr. Pearsall from the fact that  
by wishes to fence in the town,  
and establish two gates at or near  
the railroad, so as to allow people  
to cross the track, and the location  
of said gates will be such as to allow  
the said Manager to see that the  
said gates are kept closed. For  
this relief we respectfully beg: Isaac  
A. Orr, J. A. Honquet, Jr., Isaac  
Talley, Will Gilman, John Conly,  
Edw. Edmund, Chas. Singleton,  
Will Edmund, P. Moran, per J. A.  
Bousquet, Jr., Edwin Orr and E.  
Moran, per J. A. Bousquet, Jr.  
The above petition was granted,  
at the expense of the E. L. R. R. Co.,  
with the understanding that they  
will put the new road in as good  
a condition as the old road was.  
On motion, duly seconded, the  
Coroner was authorized to procure  
a record book of vital statistics, as  
required by law.  
The following

FERRY PETITION  
from Madisonville was read and ac-  
cepted:  
Madisonville, La., Oct. 9, 1900.  
To the honorable President and mem-  
bers of the Police Jury:  
Gentlemen—We, the undersigned  
wish to call your attention to the  
condition of the ferry road below  
W. T. Jay's mill, as far as the ferry  
crossing.  
It is now and has been for some  
time utterly neglected, and practi-  
cally impassable, and in wet weather  
the ferry cannot be approached  
within a distance of 400 yards, and  
even in ordinary times is both  
dangerous and unsafe.  
Also it is common report that the  
language used at the ferry crossing  
is at times of the worst kind and  
unfit for any lady to hear passing  
along the street.  
As it is I believe in the contract  
of the ferry man, to remedy the  
above, I beg to call your attention  
to the fact that they exist at the  
present time.

It was moved by Mr. Parker,  
seconded by Mr. Williams, that the  
resolution and petition adopted  
April 10, 1894, which reads as fol-  
lows:  
Madisonville, La., March 13, 1894.  
To the honorable President and mem-  
bers of the Police Jury:  
Gentlemen—I, the undersigned,  
do report the convenience and want

of the public road beginning at W.  
T. Jay's saw mill and running to  
Madisonville, about one mile  
along the swamp. The right of  
way is to be cut all the way, and  
the road is to be filled about three  
feet all the way, to make a good  
road. I will take the contract of  
cutting out and building one mile  
of swamp road and ferry, for  
twenty-five years, for what it will  
bring. Recommended by W. T.  
Jay and Mr. Davis.  
H. H. HARRIS.  
On motion, duly seconded, the  
above petition was received and the  
right granted, to date from April  
11, 1894.  
The said H. H. Harris having  
failed to comply with his agreement,  
and having abused the privileges  
granted, the same be and are here-  
by rescinded: Carried unanimously.

The following communication was  
then read:  
Parish of St. Tammany, State of  
Louisiana.  
To the honorable President and mem-  
bers of the Police Jury:  
Gentlemen—I, Eugene Mugnier,  
will take the ferry crossing the river  
at Jay's mill, on the same conditions  
and obligations as H. H. Harris  
took to run it. Respectfully,  
E. MUGNIER.  
On motion of Jos. M. Smith,  
seconded by G. C. Alexius, the fol-  
lowing resolutions were unanimously  
adopted:  
That the privilege of running the ferry, at Madis-  
onville, be awarded to Eugene Mug-  
nier, under the following conditions,  
to-wit: That the said Eugene  
Mugnier shall keep a good flat and  
cross people and conveyances at all  
times, and without delay.  
Resolved further, That the said  
Eugene Mugnier shall keep the road  
from Jay's mill, through the swamp  
to the flat, in good and passable  
condition.  
The rates of ferrage to be as fol-  
lows:  
Footman, 5cts.  
Horseback, 10cts.  
One-horse vehicle, 25cts.  
Two-horse vehicle or three yoke  
of oxen, 50cts.  
Four yokes of oxen or over, \$1 00.  
Night ferrage double.  
The said privilege shall be granted  
to January 1, 1905.  
This Police Jury reserving the  
right, on non-compliance with the  
above agreement, to cancel the  
same.

The following Ordinances were  
read and unanimously adopted:  
ROAD LAW ORDINANCE.  
An ordinance to carry into effect,  
Articles 291, etc., of the Consti-  
tution relative to public roads.  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the  
Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish,  
Louisiana, That the Parish of St. Tam-  
many is hereby created into a road  
district.  
Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, That  
in order to raise funds for the purpose  
of constructing, maintaining and re-  
pairing the public roads and bridges of  
this St. Tammany Parish, besides the  
two mill tax heretofore levied and set

aside, there shall be imposed a per  
capita tax of one dollar per annum upon  
each able bodied male inhabitant of the  
parish between the ages of 18 and 55  
years, and an annual vehicle license,  
including bicycles and motor vehicles,  
on all vehicles used on the public roads  
as follows to-wit:  
One horse vehicle and bicycle, 50cts.  
Two horse vehicle, 75cts.  
Big wagons, \$1 00.  
Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, That  
the Police Jury member from each ward  
shall hire competent and able bodied  
laborers to work the respective roads  
in each ward, which said roads shall  
be designated by the Police Jury member  
That the said laborer shall call his  
men out and work his or their allotted  
road or roads wherever necessary, so  
that there be sufficient funds so to do.  
That said hands shall furnish their own  
tools and shall work from 7 a. m. to  
5 p. m. for a day's work.  
AN ORDINANCE.  
An Ordinance to carry into effect  
Article 291 of the Constitution, and  
to levy a per capita tax.  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the  
Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, La.  
That for the purpose of constructing,  
maintaining and repairing the public  
roads and bridges of this parish, there  
shall be imposed on the male inhabi-  
tant of the parish between the ages  
of eighteen and fifty-five years, a  
per capita tax of one dollar per annum,  
well as shall receive the party for the same.  
Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc.,  
That the per capita tax shall be levied  
between the first day of January and  
the first day of March, 1901, and each  
year thereafter, and any person failing  
to pay the per capita tax as above levied  
in Sec. 1, shall be fined in the sum of  
not less than \$5 or more than \$15, and  
in default of the payment of said fine,  
and costs, he shall be sentenced to  
work on the public roads for a period  
of time not to exceed 30 days, at the  
discretion of the Police Jury.  
Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, That  
said prosecution shall be conducted be-  
fore the District Court.  
AN ORDINANCE.  
An Ordinance to carry into effect  
Article 291 of the Constitution, and  
to levy an annual license  
on vehicles.  
Section 1. Be it ordained by the  
Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish,  
Louisiana, That all vehicles used on  
the public roads, for the purpose of con-  
structing and repairing the public roads  
and bridges of this parish, the follow-  
ing license taxes shall be levied on the  
same to-wit:  
Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc.,  
That it shall be the duty of the Sher-  
iff of this parish to provide metal plates,  
with numbers, containing the year for  
which the license is paid, and the num-  
ber of the license, on all vehicles used  
on the public roads, and each shall be re-  
corded in a book in the order in which  
issued and the name of the owner of  
the vehicle, and the number of the li-  
cense; which number shall be securely  
fixed at all times on the vehicle in a  
place where it can be readily seen.  
Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc.,  
That the license shall be paid and the  
license plates affixed between the first  
day of January and the first day of  
March, 1901, and of each year there-  
after, and the parish shall have the first  
lien and privilege on each vehicle for  
license tax, and if the owner fails to  
pay the license tax, he shall be liable  
to the Justice of the Peace Court, in  
any ward in which a vehicle may be  
found, without any other lien or privi-  
lege for the year, paying a writ of  
sequestration, directing the Constable  
to seize, sequester and take into cus-  
tody the vehicle, and to sell the same  
under the license is paid, with 8  
per cent interest and all costs, and  
prosecute the same to judgment.  
Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc.,  
That the absence of the license plate  
from the vehicle shall be cause for the  
denial that the license tax has been  
paid.
