# School Board.

July 10, 1901.

The School Board met in regular session on the above date.

Present—

- First Ward—Emile Fuhrmann.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and upon motion of Mr. Paul Saddler, seconded by Mr. Crockett, were adopted as read.

The Parish Treasurer's report was then read, showing a balance cash on hand of \$5061.45.

It was moved by Mr. Crockett, seconded by Mr. Fuhrmann, that the Treasurer's report be adopted. Carried.

It was moved by Dr. Tolson, seconded by Mr. Fuhrmann, that a committee of three be appointed to examine the warrants paid out by the Treasurer for the quarter ending June 30, 1901, and if found correct the same be destroyed.

The President appointed the following committee: Dr. Tolson, H. G. Menetre and Emile Fuhrmann.

Mr. Sadler then introduced the following resolutions:

Whereas, A report has come to the knowledge of members of the School Board that the Police Jury intends to reduce the revenue of the school fund, by reducing the present appropriation of two mills for school purposes to one mill.

Therefore be it resolved, by the Board of School Directors in regular session assembled, That we enter into a strong and emphatic protest against such action, as the revenues of the school fund are now barely sufficient to maintain a school in the various wards of sufficient length to benefit the scholars.

Be it further resolved, That we do hereby petition your honorable body, in view of the fact of the great benefits derived from proper education, and in view of the further fact of the awakened interest of the people of this parish in the cause of educational advancement. We do earnestly petition and request your honorable body to maintain the parish revenue of the school fund upon its present basis at all hazards.

On motion, seconded and carried, the resolutions were adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes.

It was moved by Mr. Sadler, seconded by Mr. Crow, that the Secretary file a copy of said resolutions with the Police Jury. Carried.

The report of the Parish Superintendent was then read as follows:

Covington, La., July 10, 1901.

To the honorable President and members of the Board of School Directors of St. Tammany Parish, La.

Gentlemen—I beg to submit for your consideration, the following report of the financial condition of the school fund and the educational condition of the public schools of this parish.

As to the financial condition, the total amount of cash on hand and unexpended for the quarter ending June 30, 1901, is \$4109.09. I submit you the following table of credit balance due each ward fund yet unexpended, for quarter ending June 30, 1901:

The receipts for the quarter ending June 30, 1901, are as follows: From the State, 745.80; from the Parish, 210.56, making a total of \$956.36, which sum must be apportioned to the various ward funds, according to the number of educable children pro rated to each ward. I submit you the following table showing the total amounts apportioned each ward fund from the gross receipts, for the quarter ending June 30, 1901, amounting to the sum of \$956.36.

After a careful consideration of tables Nos. 1, 2 and 3 you can very readily comprehend that the financial condition of the school fund is in a splendid condition—a condition secured and maintained by a wise and conservative course in expenditure—a course, gentlemen, I sincerely trust will be maintained in the future. As to the educational condition of the public schools, I am not at present prepared to submit you the report I desire, on account of lack of proper data at this time. My desire was to submit a full and exhaustive report of the schools, but will defer it until your next regular session, in October.

The average attendance has increased in all the country schools, with the exception of one or two. The average attendance of schools maintained in the towns has rather decreased during the past month. I therefore offer the suggestion that all town schools open in the middle of September and close a month earlier, and the country schools the middle of October, for the session of 1901-1902. Gentlemen, we have every reason in the world to congratulate ourselves on the success of the school term just closed. We have given positive proof to the public what can be done in the way of education under even somewhat unfavorable circumstances. By a sturdy adherence to the system we have adopted, I am satisfied in the course of the next year the children in this parish can acquire in our schools as fair an education as can be obtained in any other parish of this State. It should not only be a duty but our pride to consummate this end.
