## DIXON ACADEMY.

Prof. Wm. A. Dixon has just returned from the North, where he has been spending the summer visiting numerous Preparatory Schools from time to time, in the neighborhood of New York and Boston, and is now getting everything at Dixon Academy ready for the opening on the first of October.

The large addition that was being built in connection with one of the Academy buildings has just been completed. The object of this addition is to increase the dining room capacity, and, on the second floor, to furnish room for the matron and lady teachers. This enlargement of the dining room being especially necessary owing to the prospect of a considerable increase in the number of boarding students this fall.

After spending several weeks this summer in considering numerous applications from various teachers, Prof. Dixon finally selected two very excellent men to further assist him in the management of the Academy. One, Prof. H. N. Holmes, of New Wilmington, Penn., was graduated with distinction from the Scientific Department of New Wilmington College, and has since been teaching with great success in Pennsylvania. The other, Prof. Charles Garland, of Concord, Mass., is a Harvard graduate. He received his early education in French Switzerland, thus becoming thoroughly familiar with French, Spanish, German and Italian. Both of these gentlemen, besides being teachers of rare qualifications, are good musicians and take a keen interest in all athletics and athletic training.

Prof. Holmes will take charge of the Department of Science and Mathematics at the Academy, and Prof. Garland that of History and Modern Languages.

All who intend to enter the Academy this fall as day scholars are expected to present themselves at the Academy on the Friday or Saturday before the regular opening, in order to be registered and properly graded, so that class work may begin at once Monday morning.

The Academy prospects for a large attendance are unusually bright, and a very successful year is hoped for.

## CHARTER.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of St. Tammany.

BE IT KNOWN, That on this twenty-first day of August, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and One, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and twenty-sixth, before me, Joseph Bradford Lancaster, a Notary Public, in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, aforesaid, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of witnesses hereafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the parties whose names are hereunto subscribed, all of full age, who declare that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws relative to the organization of corporations for manufacturing and for other purposes they have covenanted and agreed, and do by these presents covenant and agree, and bind themselves, as well as such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and a body politic in law for the purposes and objects and under the stipulations, articles and conditions following, to-wit:

The name and style of this corporation shall be Pearl River Manufacturing Company, and by that name it shall have power and authority to exist and enjoy succession for the full term and period of twenty-five years from date hereof, unless sooner dissolved.

The domicile of this corporation shall be in Pearl River, St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana. All citations and other legal processes shall be served upon the President, and in case of his absence or inability to act, upon the Vice-President. The President shall be the executive officer of the corporation, and shall preside at all the meetings of the Board of Directors and stockholders.

The objects and purposes for which this corporation is established and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be: To make and manufacture lumber and all articles of wood and wooder ware, and to construct same, and to that end to acquire, own, hold or lease lands, timber and lumber and the products of the same; to acquire, own, hold or lease, and to operate saw mills or other manufacturing of lumber or articles of wood or wooden ware, and the machinery or other articles, appliances or outfits necessary to operate the same; to sell, mortgage, pledge, lease, sub-lease, or otherwise dispose or encumber the property, real and personal or mixed of the corporation or the products thereof, and to do all such acts and things as may be necessary or proper to carry out the objects and purposes of this corporation.

This corporation may sue or be sued in its corporate name; make and use a corporate seal, the same to break and alter at pleasure; hold, have, receive, purchase, convey, sell, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge, lease, sub-lease and enjoy real, personal and mixed property; also borrow and lend money and make contracts; make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations as may be necessary, and the same to alter and change at pleasure; and shall possess all the rights and privileges to which corporations are or may be authorized and entitled to possess. This corporation may exercise its corporate powers within any other State or territory of this Union.

The capital stock of said corporation shall be Fourteen Thousand Dollars, divided into and represented by One Hundred and Forty Shares, of the sum of One Hundred Dollars Each, which said shares shall be paid for in cash, at the time of subscription or in the same may be issued, at not less than par, in payment or exchange for property or rights actually received or purchased by said corporation, or the same may be issued full paid, for money advanced and for such other valuable consideration or service as the Board of Directors of said corporation may determine, provided, that no stock shall be issued until consideration therefor has been received by said corporation. Said shares of stock shall be signed by the President and Treasurer. At all elections by or meetings of the Stockholders each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote to be cast by the person in whose name the stock appears on the books of the corporation or by his agent, or proxy, duly authorized to that effect in writing.

No stockholder shall have authority or right to sell or otherwise dispose of his stock in whole or in part without first giving to the Board of Directors fifteen days notice in writing, of his intention or desire to dispose of his stock or a part thereof and allowing the Board of Directors or in its default any stockholder the first opportunity of purchasing said stock, after which fifteen days the said stock may be sold in open market. The stock of said corporation may be transferred under the above conditions, provided such transfer therefor is made to the books of said corporation at its office in Pearl River, State, and on surrender of any fractional part of a share shall be made. This corporation shall commence doing business as soon as seven thousand dollars of the capital stock shall have been subscribed for. The Board of Directors shall have the right to determine how much stock shall be issued.

The business affairs and corporate powers of this corporation shall be transacted by a Board of Directors to be composed of three stockholders, which number may be increased to five at the discretion of the Board of Directors. No person shall be eligible a director or officer as herein provided in this charter, who is not a stockholder of this corporation. The members of the Board of Directors shall be elected by a majority of the votes of the stockholders.

cast at a meeting to be held for that purpose each year. The following persons shall constitute the first Board of Directors: G. C. Blake, F. S. Heibelbach and R. C. Penn. Said Board shall continue in office until Wednesday, August 21, 1902, or until their successors are elected. On which date and thereafter annually an election for Directors shall be held at the office of the corporation after fifteen days notice thereof shall have been given by publication in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany by two publications thereof during said time. A failure to elect directors on the date above mentioned shall not dissolve this corporation, but the then existing Board of Directors shall continue to hold office, and another election shall be held as soon thereafter as practicable, of which notice shall be given in the manner already provided for notice of meetings. Every Board of Directors shall elect a President and a Vice President, who shall also be treasurer of said corporation, from among their own number. The offices as herein created shall be filled for the ensuing year as follows: F. S. Heibelbach, President; G. C. Blake, Vice President and Treasurer.

**Article VIII.**  
Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors from any cause shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board of Directors from among the stockholders of the corporation. Two members of the Board shall constitute a quorum thereof, and all officers as will be ascertained by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall make such by-laws, rules and regulations as they may think necessary and change and alter same at pleasure. Name and appoint the secretary and other officers and employees, and fix their salaries, terms of service, with the right to dismiss them at said Board's pleasure; and said Board shall have the right to fix and determine the salaries and duties of the several officers herein provided for and to elect such other officers and employees as will best advance the interest and welfare of the corporation. They shall also have the power to sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, sub-lease and purchase property, movable, immovable, personal and mixed, borrow, lend money and issue notes and bonds; make contracts and do all things which may be necessary to properly transact and manage the business of the corporation.

**Article IX.**  
This act of incorporation may be changed, modified or amended, or said corporation may be dissolved with assent of a majority of the amount of stock present or represented at any general meeting of the stockholders of said corporation, convened for such purpose after thirty days previous notice of such meeting shall have been given by advertisement in one of the newspapers published in the Parish of St. Tammany by four publications during said time. Whenever this corporation is dissolved, either by limitation or from any other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated under the supervision of two commissioners, chosen for that purpose from among the stockholders by a majority in amount of the stockholders present or represented at a general meeting of the stockholders as above set forth in this article, said commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of the corporation shall have been fully liquidated. Should a vacancy occur in said commissioners, the survivor shall continue to act.

**Article X.**  
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts thereof in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares subscribed for or owned by him, nor shall any informality in organization have effect of rendering this charter null, or exposing a stockholder to any liability, beyond the unpaid balance, if any, of his stock.
