

## Trees Never Struck by Lightning.

"In all my forty year's experience with trees and plants," said a well known gardener, "I have yet to hear of a willow tree being struck by lightning. Spruce trees, white-wood and pine trees seem to almost attract the electricity, and oak and other large trees and even many small trees are often maimed and killed. But willow trees seem for some reason to be immune to death or injury in this shape, and I have never seen or even heard of a tree of this family which lightning has ever struck."

She used it in starting a fire and when she lighted it, an explosion followed which severely injured her. The suit was against the dealer for putting gasoline instead of kerosene into the jug.
