

## Products of Piny Woods Land.

The Ellisville News, published in southern Mississippi, thus tells what the piny woods can do, and is doing:

"One of Ellisville's prominent business men, who is well acquainted with the farming portion of our population, kindly gives the News the following facts and figures regarding the productiveness of the soil and its possibilities under the cultivation of clear-headed and industrious farmers.

One planter, with only the help of his three children, two boys and a girl, raised this year eighteen bales of cotton, sold more than \$200 worth of potatoes, \$127 worth of molasses, \$35 worth of melons, raised his own hogs and fattened them, raised 100 bushels of corn, 50 bushels of peas, and made his living out of the soil. How is that for piny woods land?

"Another farmer raised, on 30 acres of piny woods land, 25 bales of cotton this year. When it is remembered that cotton is worth about \$40 per bale, what do you think of the money-earning capacity of Jones county dirt?

"Another marketed 38 bales of cotton, made his own meat, potatoes, fodder, etc., and marketed surplus 100 bushels of corn. Now where can you beat that sort of a crop in an off year?

The News has repeatedly stated that any man of ordinary intelligence and industry can get a living out of piny woods soil. This goes to prove it. The one great lesson that our farmers need to learn is the lesson of diversified farming and home living. Raise your own bacon; don't depend on Yankee farmers for hog. Cut canned sardines off your bill of fare and preserve the peaches that rot on your trees every summer. Canned peaches beat canned sardines every day in the year, and if you raise your own peaches they are cheaper. Grow your own little vegetable patch, make your own corn, raise your own fodder, and raise an acre or two of cane. You can make your own way out of poverty if you will. The Almighty never intended a man to live in poverty in the piny woods if he would use his head and his brains together."

## Bananas and Cream.

A dainty and delicious breakfast dish is made by slicing bananas and serving them with cream. But just a word of warning if one wants to be up to the new standards of hygienic eating. Don't sprinkle with sugar, as of old. "Nature has sugared this fruit already to her own taste," said a well-known physician to Eve, and, served with cream, it is a very nutritious and healthful dish. But with sugar added it is a sure road to indigestion and dyspepsia.

Dire and awful were the consequences (according to this physician) which Dame Nature visits upon the reckless mortal who insists upon the childish habit of sugaring this fruit. Fermentation was one of the pleasant details he mentioned as part of the process of punishment which nature inflicts upon the transgressor of her laws, and anyone who heard the rest of it would never desire to transgress them again in this particular instance, at least.—Times-Democrat.
