Fox Hunting.

Col. E. S. Cobb of the Governor's staff has been very successful in his fox chasing over at his lodge in St. Tammany Parish. Col. Cobb now owns twenty-one fox hounds, the finest pack of dogs of their breed in the south. Many of these dogs are from famous kennels in Kentucky, and have taken prizes in this field of sport. Since Nov. 15, Col. Cobb has run down and caught twenty-five foxes. The Colonel's stud of hunters has just been increased by the addition of a high-class steeplechaser, giving him four horses in all. With these mounts he is well equipped for the chase. Last week he had a number of friends with him from this city, who participated in an exciting chase, and they were rewarded by catching five foxes. When Col. Cobb first established his lodge in St. Tammany the good people of that section told him that there was no such game as foxes in that neck of the woods, but since his success the entire community is joining in with sportmanlike ardor.—Times Democrat.

Last Monday's Picayune contains a picture and sketch of Mr. Duncan F. Young, a native of Covington, and at present a prominent citizen of Amite City, where he is cashier of the Bank, and has attained some prominence in literary circles.

Here is a suggestion to our grape growers and wine makers, and there are a number in this parish. Until oats get cheaper, they may find it economical to feed their stock on bran and wine.
