Physiology in Public Schools.
Office State Superintendent of Public Education
Baton Rouge, La., Feb. 24, 1902.
To Parish Superintendent:
Dear Sir—I have been requested to call your attention to Section 133 of the Public School Laws, as modified by order of the State Board of Education. It is Sec. 1, Act 40, of 1888, and is as follows:

"In addition to the branches, in which instruction is now given in the public schools, instruction shall also be given as to the nature of alcoholic drinks and narcotics, and special instruction as to their effects upon the human system in connection with the several divisions of the subjects of relative physiology and hygiene, and such subjects shall be taught as regularly as other branches are taught in said schools. Such instruction shall be given orally from a text book in the hands of the teacher, and shall be given by the use of the text books in the hands of the pupils in the case of those who are able to read, and such instruction shall be given as aforesaid to all pupils in all public schools in the State, at all the grades until completed in the high schools."

The State Board of Education, at its meeting last July, selected and adopted for all the public schools of Louisiana, Blaisdell's Physiology, as the text book to be used for the instruction required to be given by this Act.
