FAIRVIEW.

We paid a visit to Fairview last Sunday, in company with the energetic proprietor, Dr. J. O. Flower. In just six minutes after passing the limits of New Covington, we arrived at the place, and were astonished at the vast amount of work done there in the past two weeks. Miles of fencing are being built, requiring over 90,000 pounds of wire, and thousands of posts, the underbrush is being cleared out, giving a good view of the place, and there will be about ten miles of winding drives through it when the projected roads are completed. A system of water works will soon be constructed, and no expense is being spared to beautify the place, which bids fair to become one of the noted spots in the State, for a summer or winter residence, within easy reach of New Orleans, either by rail or steamer. It is an ideal place now for pious, and Dr. Flower assured us that he had no objection to pioneers spending the day there, on the banks of the beautiful Tobefuncta, under the spreading oaks. When the improvements are completed Fairview will become an additional attraction to our town and parish.

A Rector Called.

Christ's Episcopal Church, in Covington, has called the Rev. Doctor Allen Antrim, late of the Diocese of Iowa, to become its Rector. Rev. Antrim has been in the State since last May, nearly one year, and officiated at the Church of the Annunciation in New Orleans all of last summer, as temporary Rector in the absence of Doctor Percival, who, with his daughter, spent last summer in California. Since then Rev. Antrim has been doing special service under the direction of Bishop Sessums, in the Diocese of Louisiana. The whole of Lent Doctor Antrim spent as Rector temporary at Trinity Church, Galveston, and held daily service in that city. On account of the health of his wife, and because of the infatuation for the climate and his love of the South, and its health resort, he will locate here. The Rectory will be put in perfect shape, and occupied by the new Rector. Service every Sunday except the 1st and 3rd Sundays of each month. A choir will at once be organized, and the organ will be supplemented by violin and other instruments. All are invited, who do not attend elsewhere, to these services.

The Presbytery of New Orleans.

It is something in the history of Presbyterianism in Covington to have Presbytery meet with us this month. It is many years since Covington entertained the Presbytery, possibly as far back as the fifties. Word has been received from some of the brethren that they expected to meet us, among them the Rev. B. M. Palmer, D. D. We expect to have with us about twenty or twenty-five Ministers and Elders. As has been announced, the time for convening is next Tuesday, April 15, 1902. Rev. H. C.
