Official. AN ORDINANCE. Dedicating a portion of the Pavilion for public school purposes. Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, that thirty feet by sixty feet of each end of the Pavilion be dedicated for public school purposes. That the School Board for the Parish of St. Tammany shall have absolute control of said part of said Pavilion, dedicated for such a length of time, provided that said part of Pavilion shall not be used for any other purpose than educational purposes. Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., that there shall be no public or private entertainment, in said Pavilion, during school hours. C. Z. WILLIAMS, Mayor. W. G. KENTZEL, Secretary. Official. ORDINANCE. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, Louisiana, that in order to provide funds for the purpose of building a new jail for the Parish: 1. That there is hereby set aside one and one-half (1 1/2) mills of the criminal fund as provided in the budget made at the January meeting, 1902, for the purpose of building a jail. 2. That besides said 1 1/2 mill there shall be and is hereby set aside 1/2 mill of the general expense fund as per budget made at January meeting 1902 for the purpose of building a jail, making a total of 2 mills. 3. That the President of the board appoint a committee of 3 members of the board with himself, as ex-officio member, together with the Sheriff of the parish, as a committee of four with full authority to have the jail constructed as soon as possible. Carried. The President appointed on the above committee: Messrs. G. C. Alexis, Wm. Bruhl, Jos. M. Smith, T. E. Brewster and Geo. Koeppe, Jr., ex-officio. Adopted April 7, 1902. GEO. Frazee, Auditor of Public Accounts of said State, dated April 11, 1902, I will proceed to sell, according to law, at public auction, to the last and highest bidder, at the front door of the courthouse, in the town of Covington, Parish and State aforesaid, on SATURDAY, May 24, 1902, at 10 o'clock A. M., the following described school land, viz: Section sixteen, township five south range ten east, in St. Tammany Parish, in quantities of not less than 40 acres nor more than 160 acres, as per plat of survey to be exhibited on the day of sale, after due appraisal, according to law.
