### Registration of Voters

Attorney General Guion has furnished Secretary of State Michel with a written opinion as to the powers and duties of the parish assessors with reference to the registering of voters in the years other than those in which general state elections are held. New and complete registrations are required in the latter years, but while the law is not specific on the subject of what shall be done at other times, the attorney general is of the opinion that the intention of the lawmakers was to provide for the opening and revision of the rolls before all elections, "otherwise no voter would be permitted to exercise the privilege of voting at a congressional or other election unless he had registered during the period of registration had just previous to the general state election." The language of section 23 of act 199 of 1898, which provides that the books, papers and records of assessors and clerks of registration shall at all times "be open to inspection by the public, provided the same does not interfere with registration," is interpreted as implying that a registration may be carried on at any time.

The secretary of state is therefore advised that it will be proper for him "to notify the registrars of voters in the country parishes of the state that it is their duty to register all voters legally qualified, who may present themselves for registration in order to take part in the congressional election this year."
