The present Mayor and Board of Aldermen have shown a progressive spirit during the past year, and are actively identified with the business interests of the town. If they will consent to serve another term, the affairs of the town will be in safe hands.

Last Tuesday the citizens of Hammond voted on a special five mill tax for ten years, in aid of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad. The question was carried by the following property vote: For the tax, \$60,000; against, \$2,500.
