Burns, attorney, be instructed to look up the law, and if the same justifies it, to draft an ordinance making it obligatory on the part of all persons expecting to open burrows to get a permit from the Town Council, and forbidding the locating of a barroom within 300 feet of an established schoolhouse or church. Carried.
