Recipe For Mange.

I keep fox hounds and have tried many so-called remedies for mange, but without success. About five years ago I tried the following and it has never failed:

Give heaping teaspoonful of sulphur daily for three or four days. Rub as much sulphur into lard as it will take without making the lard too stiff and rub the dog, using the hand for the purpose, for three or four days daily. Tie the dog, else he will rub the ointment off. Feed well and you will soon have a well dog.
