The Useful Hairpin.

"If you need a hairpin just ask the doctor for it when he comes around," said a man who keeps in touch with the medical profession, "and the chances are that you will get what you want. He might not have one, but he is just as apt as not to have it. You see, a Philadelphia physician has suddenly found that the hairpin is a very useful thing in surgery, and has commended its use to the profession generally. This article of the feminine toilet he says can be put to many uses, and the fact that its almost universal presence brings it in touch with every emergency adds much to its value. He argues that the hairpin is easily sterilized, it is convenient in size, and can be bent and twisted into almost any shape. Besides they are very cheap. If it should become necessary to use the hairpin in connection with an infectious or contagious case of any sort, why, the thing can be thrown away. It is cheap, and the loss is small. The straight hairpin may be used to pin on badges, or to remove foreign bodies from any natural passage, or as a curette for scraping away soft material, or to compress a blood vessel in stopping a hemorrhage, or to close a wound, and for variety of other purposes. It can be used as a probe when straightened out. It can be used to wire bones together in case of fracture. It can be used in actual cautery when heated to redness in a flame. The physician who reasons thus hopefully and enthusiastically about the hairpin insists that it may do service as a nasal speculum, surgical needle, in tracheotomy, to maintain an opening until the proper tube can be obtained, or to bring the edges of a wound together, and so forth and so on. Of course all physicians do not use hairpins for the purposes indicated. But it is a fact that many physicians have used them in cases of emergency in one or the other of the ways indicated. So I say if you need a hairpin ask your physician for it, for he might have a few stored away in a snug place in the satchel he carries around with him."—Times-Democrat.
