The Cotton Crop.

The Government report for the month of July gives an average condition for the entire belt of 81.9 per cent. compared with 84.7 per cent. last month, a moderate loss in condition, hardly in keeping with popular ideas, but not unusual at this period of the season. The comparison with the August report of last year shows a gain in condition of 4.7 per cent. better than last year, and when the crop proved to be in the neighborhood of 10,400,000 bales, and practically 6 per cent. better than the year before, when the yield aggregated 10,383,000 bales.
