PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
CONSTITUTION, TO BE VOTED
FOR AT ELECTION TO BE
HELD TUESDAY,
NOVEMBER 4.

Act No. 30. Senate Bill No. 61.
JOINT RESOLUTION.
Proposing an amendment to Article 47 of
the Constitution of the State of Louisiana,
relative to the mode of electing judges of
the courts of appeal, and for other purposes.
Enacted into law by the City of New Orleans
on the 12th day of May, 1902, and approved
by the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of
New Orleans to make all payments
thereunder in accordance with the provisions
of the law and under the authority of the
Mayor and the Board of Aldermen of New Orleans.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the general
assembly of the State of Louisiana, two-thirds
of the members elected to each
branch of the legislature, that the following
amendments to Article 47 of the Constitution
of the State of Louisiana be submitted to the
electors of the State at the next general
election to be held on the first Monday in
November, 1902, to-wit:

Section 2. Be it further resolved, etc.,
That Article 47 of the Constitution of the
State of Louisiana be amended so as to
read as follows, to-wit:
"Article 47. The general assembly shall
have no power to transfer authority to any
parish or municipal authority to grant any
extra compensation, fee or allowance to a
public officer, agent, servant, or contractor,
nor to authorize the payment of any claim
against the State or any parish or municipality
thereof under any agreement or contract
made without express authority of law,
and all agreements or contracts for the
purchase of public improvements or entered
into by the City of New Orleans prior to
the date of the adoption of this amendment
are hereby authorized to make all payments
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Section 3. Be it further resolved, etc.,

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THE CONSTITUTION OF 1879, as amended
and which shall be judicially con-
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of Louisiana, and which shall be issued
for the current month in which the Con-
stitution is adopted, are hereby declared to
be valid and binding upon the people,
and the revenues of the respective states
which said fund was made dependent.
The Board of Liquidation of the State
of Louisiana, created by the present
Constitution, is hereby authorized to
therefore the bonds heretofore authorized
to be issued by the City of New Orleans
in accordance with the provisions of the
said Constitution, and to provide for the
payment of the same, and to issue
and sell bonds in the sum of two hundred
and twenty-five thousand dollars, or so
much as may be necessary, to be issued
and sold by the Board of Liquidation of
the City of New Orleans, and to be
dated July 1st, 1898, and made payable
in gold or silver, or in any other

coupons payable January 1st, 1899; and
