WANTED - An engineer or fireman, and ten Brickyard Hands, at Alexius' Brickyard. An Ordinance Forbidding the Selling of Game. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of St. Tammany, that it shall be unlawful for any person to sell, barter, or exchange any deer, wild turkeys, quail or partridges, to any merchant or other person within the confines of the Parish, or any other place in the State of Louisiana. That any person violating the provisions of this law shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and if found guilty be fined in sum of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100, and in default of payment of fine and costs he shall be imprisoned in the Parish Jail, not to exceed 60 days.
