Incendiarism.

About 9 o'clock last Tuesday
night smoke was discovered issu-
ing from the two-story frame
building on Columbia street, own-
ed by Mr. Jack Pelloat and occu-
pied as a dress-making establish-
ment, by Mrs. S. M. Gage. In a
short time the alarm was given, and
our citizens rallied to the scene
and extinguished the flames. An
investigation showed that the bed-
ding, furniture and stairway were
saturated with coal oil, and it was
plainly evident that the fire had
been started with felonious intent.
Mrs. Gage, who kept the dress-
making establishment, was not in
the building at the time, as she
was staying with her parents in
another part of town. If the fire
had gained headway, it would
have resulted in a most disastrous
conflagration, as the building is
in the heart of the business section,
surrounded by stores on all sides.
The Grand Jury, which was in ses-
sion this week, promptly investi-
gated the matter, and as a result,
Mrs. Gage was indicted on suspi-
cion as being the guilty party, and
she was placed under arrest by the
Sheriff.

The accused was arraigned before
Judge Thompson last Thursday,
and entered a plea of not guilty.
The case will be tried at the March
term of Court.

Jail Committee.

Covington, La., Dec. 10, 1902.
The jail committee met at the
Courthouse on the above date, per-
suant to appointment.

Present—G. C. Alexius, H. Q.
Parker, Wm. Bruhl, T. E. Brew-
ster, and Geo. Koepf, Jr.
The committee reported that they
had examined the new parish jail,
and found that it was completed,
according to plans and specifica-
tions.

It was moved, and duly seconded,
that the jail building be accepted.
Carried.

The following proposition was
then read:

Covington, La., Dec. 10, 1902.
To the honorable president and mem-
bers of the Police Jury.

Gentlemen—We propose to fur-
nish and erect four (4) tool-proof
steel cells, on second floor of the
new parish jail, according to plans
and specifications prepared by Mr.
Howard Burns, Architect, for the
sum of seventeen hundred and fifty
(1750) dollars. We are to omit
the partition over cells. If the jump
locks are used instead of those
specified, will be twenty dollars
additional. The amount of sixteen
hundred and fifty dollars to be paid
when cages are delivered in Cov-
ington, La., and inspected by the
Architect.

The above proposition was ac-
cepted.

It was moved, and seconded,
that Jenkins Bros. be authorized to
get a No. 23 heater to be put in
the parish jail. Carried.

On motion, duly seconded, the
committee then adjourned.

This is surely the land of fruit
and vegetables. All we need is a
canning factory, to encourage the
growth and create a demand for
them in large quantities.

For an old-fashioned dinner to be
given during the holiday season, ex-
tend a long table across the dining
room, and according to tradition,
provide a smaller one for the
younger folks. The table should
be covered with a Turkey red cloth
and set with old fashioned pieces of
crockery, glass and silver. Pro-
vide a plain, substantial menu, such
as roast pig, chicken pie, roast
turkey, mashed potatoes, turnips,
squash and onions, baked beans and
brown bread, mince and pumpkin
pies. In the center of the table
place a large pumpkin hollowed out
and filled with apples and oranges.
