DISTRICT COURT.

The March term of the District Court, Judge Jas. M. Thompson presiding and District Attorney Gordon W. Goodbee at his post, adjourned last Tuesday afternoon. The following cases were tried since our report of last week:

State vs Charles Bradley, assault and battery, not guilty.

State vs Rosa McMillan et al, keeping a disorderly house, not guilty.

State vs Allbrook, disturbing peaceable assembly and carrying concealed weapon, not guilty.

Emancipation of Rosa Mendow, judgment for applicant.

Bernard Schwartz vs E. E. Schmalz, judgment for plaintiff.

H. T. Cottam & Co vs Piano and J. P. Pelloat, judgment as in case of non suit.

State vs Henry Sharp, disturbing peace near private house of Jno. Hunt, not guilty.

Henry W. Hullinghorst vs Bank of Covington dismissed at plaintiff's cost.

M. C. Day vs Mathew Mizell and Walter Pierce, dismissed at defendant's cost.

State vs Charles Smith, petit larceny, 60 days in parish jail and cost of prosecution, and in default of paying cost, 30 days more in jail.

State vs Carl Henricks, embezzlement, 6 months in parish jail and pay cost of prosecution, and in default of payment, 30 days more in jail.

State vs Sam Hoffman, murder, 20 years in Penitentiary and \$5 fine.

State vs Cost Brown, maiming a mule, fined \$5 and cost of prosecution, and in default 20 days in jail.

State vs Alex Montgomery, selling liquor within 5 miles of schools in Pearlinton and Logtown, Miss., fined \$25 and cost of prosecution, and in default, 60 days in jail.

State vs Berles Pessman, assault and battery, 5 months in jail and cost of prosecution and in default, 1 month more in jail, subject to the Police Jury.

State vs Almore Hart, assault and battery, not guilty.

State vs John Bruhl, failing to pay per capita road tax, null pros.

Naturalization of R. V. Bredon, judgment for applicant.

The District Attorney filed 471 bills of information.

Capitalists Looking After Investments.

The Daily States of last Tuesday says: A party of distinguished capitalists and business men arrived in the city this morning under the escort of L. R. Holmes, of Laporte, Tex., and immediately went out to view the large tract of swamp lands which Mr. Holmes recently purchased in St. Bernard and Plaquemines Parishes. They will also visit the town site of St. Tammany, across the lake in the piny woods. The party have just returned from La Porte, Tex., where the enterprises Mr. Holmes has there have been looked into.

In the party are J. F. O' Shaughnessy, of New York; S. H. Chisholm, of Cleveland, O.; A. P. Bradstreet, of Waterbury, Ct.; C. H. Briggs, of New York; Capt. N. G. Read, of Boston; Frank J. Kilpatrick, of New York, and A. W. Hart, of New York.

The party left the St. Charles Hotel for the tour of inspection at 11 o'clock. Accompanying Mr. Holmes, and the visitors were Attorney Lloyd Posey, of this city, and O. W. Crawford, who pushed the St. Tammany town site proposition so vigorously last summer.

Mr. Posey has for some time been interested in promoting an electric railroad across the lake, and while the gentlemen are all very quiet and reticent as to the purpose of their tour of inspection it is said that it is not at all improbable that a large company will be formed for the purpose of putting through the various enterprises, including certain propositions at La Porte, Tex.


