Bank Checks.

Rules Relating to their Issue, Acceptance and Payment.

Bank checks possess many advantages for the conduct of business, and are used to a proportionately great extent. They are in nature but orders for the payment of money, and are payable in the order in which they are presented.

Checks should be dated. If not dated at all, and they do not contain any statement as to when they are to be paid, they are never payable. They may be ante or post-dated, as well as dated on the day of delivery.

CHARTER.

COVINGTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

BE IT KNOWN, That on the 3d day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and two, before me, H. R. Warren, Clerk of Court and Ex-Officio Notary Public, personally came and appeared Lycurgus Poole, Maxwell Edgar, Charles K. Mullings, M. G. Pearsall, C. H. Chamberlin, Jasper Wilson, Harlan E. Ellis, Margaret Orr Edgar, a feme sol; Margaret Edgar, a feme sol; Manie Edgar, duly authorized by her husband, Preston Burns; Robina Edgar, duly authorized by her husband, Clifton Burns; Sophie Edgar, duly authorized by her husband, Geo. Menetre; Ella Cox, duly authorized by her husband, Charles Frederick; Jesse Cox, a feme sol; Tillie Gussman, duly authorized by her husband, S. M. Poole; Gertrude Gussman, a feme sol, duly authorized by her husband, Charles K. Mullings; Effie Hall, duly authorized by her husband, M. Laorols; Grace Cowles, duly authorized by her husband, N. G. Pearsall; Sarah Heild Silliman, a feme sol; Juliette Chamberlin, a feme sol; C. Ellis, a feme sol; and John M. Williams, all of whom are residing in the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and who declare that with the view of continuing the existence and furtherance of the same, they have organized, organized and formed themselves, with such other persons as are now, or may hereafter join them, into a corporation and have adopted the following articles of incorporation and by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and control of the affairs of said congregation as may be necessary.

Article I.

The name and style of this corporation shall be the COVINGTON PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, and by that corporate name the said congregation shall have power and authority to enjoy and have succession for a period of ninety-nine years, to contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name, to make and use a corporate seal, to have, hold, purchase, convey, mortgage, hypothecate, lease, receive, or pledge property, both real and personal; to lend money on mortgage or otherwise; to have and employ such managers, trustees, officers, agents and other employees, as the interests and necessities of the congregation may require; and to make and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations for the proper management and control of the affairs of said congregation as may be necessary.

Article II.

The domicile of said corporation shall be in the town of Covington, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, and all citations and other legal process shall be served on the President of the Board of Trustees, and in his absence on the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Board.

Article III.

The objects and purposes of this corporation are and shall be to preserve and perpetuate the divine worship of God, to assist in the erection of churches, to aid foreign and domestic missions, and to do any and all acts that will promote and advance the building and advancement of Christianity and Religion.

Article IV.

All the corporate power of said congregation shall be vested in and exercised by a Board of Trustees, composed of not less than five or more than nine persons, four of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business. Said Board shall be elected on the second Thursday of May in each year, and it shall immediately after said election select from among their number, a President, and Secretary and Treasurer, said officers shall be members in good standing of said congregation.

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Whereas, it is provided by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved March 16, 1870, that an election shall be held on the first Monday in June of each year, by the qualified electors of the town of Covington, St. Tammany Parish, La., for the purpose of electing one Mayor and six Aldermen to sit down at large, to serve as such for the ensuing twelve months thereafter, and it being the duty of the Clerk of the Court of said parish to call said election—

Now, therefore, I, H. R. Warren, clerk of the twenty-sixth judicial district, for the parish of St. Tammany, La., in compliance with the third section of said act, do issue this notice, notifying all persons concerned to hold said election, on

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Article V.

This charter may be amended, or this corporation may be dissolved, with the assent of three-fourths of the members of the congregation in good standing, at a special meeting convened for that purpose, after at least fifteen days written notice of such meeting shall have been given through the mail to such members, at their last known place of residence, provided that no amendment
