Way of Dealing with Boll Weevil.

Mexia, Tex., July 22.—J. B. Mathis, a cotton planter living near here, set boys to work picking boll weevils and paid them by the hundred. They have destroyed 12,000 by actual count, and so far as can be seen, the field is clear of the pest. The same plan has been adopted by other farmers, and, as a rule, they are not troubled with the bugs.

A mammoth watch built for the occasion, on such a large scale that people may walk around in it, among the moving wheels, will be on exhibition at the World's Fair. Visitors will thus be able to study the mechanism of a watch without the aid of a glass.

The bulls of the cotton market scout the idea that the present high price of cotton is the cause of the mills shutting down. Buy at Home.

If you receive a catalogue from any mail order house, says an Iowa exchange, and conclude to buy anything they advertise, go to your home merchant, tell him what you want, that you are ready to pay cash, then add the cost you are compelled to pay and see if your home merchant cannot furnish the goods or articles as cheap as the foreign one can. This is only fair. Besides helping your neighbor in a deal of this kind, you have the opportunity of examining the article before purchasing it, and the responsibility of the home merchant to make good defects. 
