

Paper Plant for the South

The Department of Agriculture is now experimenting with the culture of the mitsumata, a Japanese paper plant which is believed to be adapted to the Southern section of the country. The manufacture of the paper from the bark of this plant supports 40,000,000 Japanese. The mitsumata flourishes on land too poor for rice and does well in a clay soil. Its pulp sells for from 15 to 16 cents, gold, per pound.

The right sort of farmer can make money, or what is money's equivalent, by buying a farm of poor land at poor land prices, and proceeding to convert this waste into a rich and productive farm. We have seen this done more than once. All that is necessary is to find out what the soil needs and to supply it, while making a living from it during the process.—Farm and Ranch.
