Twenty-sixth Judicial District Court of Louisiana, in and for the Parish of St. Tammany.

BEIT KNOWN and remembered, That on this 21st day of December, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and three, being the day fixed therefor by law, I, L. R. Warren, Clerk of the Twenty-sixth Judicial District Court and ex-Officio Jury Commissioner for the Parish of St. Tammany, having previously summoned in writing, Charles Oulliber, H. A. Verret, V. H. Frederick, H. J. Smith and S. J. Talley, Jury Commissioners, and A. Frosch and J. L. Beaucaudray, fresh jurors, and citizens of said Parish, as witnesses, to appear on this day; and Charles Oulliber, V. H. Frederick, H. J. Smith and H. A. Verret, Jury Commissioners, (S. J. Talley, being absent) having appeared in my office, in the Courtroom in the Town of Covington, Louisiana, the place designated by me, did proceed with the Jury Commissioners, in the presence of the witnesses aforesaid, to examine the general Venire List, and strike therefrom the names of all persons who have served as grand and regular jurors since the previous drawing of the general venire, as well as all those persons who have died, removed from the parish, or otherwise disqualified, and to remove from the list the names of the persons so stricken from the list.
