A Good Cement.
 An "unbreakable" cement is made by pouring the white of an egg on some powdered quicklime; add to this a whey made of equal parts of vinegar and milk. The mixture should be beaten well and slightly warmed. When mending, the broken edges of the china must be warmed before applying the cement, a very thin coat of which will be sufficient. Press corresponding edges firmly together for a few minutes and do not handle the article again until the cement is dried.

NEW SCHOOL BOOKS.
Contract to be Let by State Board March 20.
 Baton Rouge, Jan. 10.—The Board of Education adjourned tonight at 10 o'clock, after a busy session of half a day, during which a contract was agreed on upon which bids for furnishing uniform textbooks to be adopted at a meeting to be held March 20, are to be based. The manufacturers whose books are to be selected will be given until Feb. 6 to file their bids, and the contract will be in effect from Sept. 1, 1905, until August 31, 1907. At the conclusion of a long executive session, the representatives of the various publishers, who had been waiting in the ante room, were admitted to a general conference, and the most feasible plans of getting the books to the pupils at the lowest price were freely discussed. Among several other resolutions adopted by the board was one by Attorney General Guion, as follows:
 "That the compensation to be paid to the parish treasurers throughout the State for disbursing public school funds, as fixed by a resolution of this board, adopted on the 11th day of August, 1903, interpreting the resolutions of the 26th day of July 1901, previously adopted, be calculated upon the amount so disbursed by them between the 1st of January and the 31st of December of each year."
 The resolution is to be effective at once.

A resolution was also adopted authorizing the parish school boards to keep an account with the sheriff, charging him for all fees and forfeits, as shown by the minutes of the court.

State to Extend its Farming Operations.
 The Board of Control of the State Penitentiary has closed the deal for the purchase of Oakley plantation, near the station of St. Gabriel, on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad in the parish of Iberville, upon which a part of the State's convict labor will be employed in the future.

The property contains 1400 acres, of which 836 acres are cleared land and 570 in light timber. The purchase price of this is \$40,000 deducting the value of corn, hay, mules, farming implements, etc., together with the seed cane and stubble, would leave the value of the land about \$33,000, equal to \$23 per acre all around, or \$10 per acre for the woodland and \$33 for the cleared land per acre. It is adapted to corn, cotton sugar cane and rice. There is a pumping plant with syphon on the plantation. Lumber is now being brought from Angola plantation by barge to put up temporary quarters. The crop will be pitched this year, probably 300 acres in cane, 800 acres in cotton, and 260 acres in corn. In the next year or so, bricks, slate and material will be moved from Baton Rouge to put up permanent brick quarters. The increase of 132 men in the penitentiary population during 1904 rendered it absolutely necessary to put in more acreage to keep this labor employed. The board has not been able to clear up land at Angola and Hope fast enough to meet the requirements.

Fox Hunting.
 Last Sunday morning Col. E. S. Cobb, accompanied by Smith Cobb and Norvin T. Harris, rode six miles through the woods of St. Tammany with eighteen hounds, and started a fox on the trail. For forty minutes the hunters and hounds chased the fox. The dogs finally ran down the animal and killed him. Col. Cobb returned to the city Monday morning. Messrs. Harris and Cobb remained over to go on another hunt Monday morning. They were successful in running down another fox.

Col. Cobb has a large pack of hounds, many of them taking prizes at various bench shows. Only one of the youngest hounds of the pack, has always held her own in the chase. Several hounds were lately received from Virginia. Under the careful training of Col. Cobb, they soon became acquainted with the St. Tammany woods, and have made valued additions to the pack.

LICENSE ORDINANCE.

1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Tammany, Louisiana, That a license be and is hereby levied for the year 1905, upon each person, corporation, firm or association pursuing any occupation, business or calling in this parish which is subject to State license.

2. Be it further ordained, etc., that the amount of license due this parish for each trade, occupation, business or calling be as follows: or conducted in this parish, subject to a license, is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for each trade, occupation, business or calling in this parish.

3. Be it further ordained, etc., that the licenses due this parish for each trade, occupation, business or calling be as follows: or conducted in this parish, subject to a license, is hereby fixed at the same as is now levied and collected by the State for each trade, occupation, business or calling in this parish.

PER CAPITA TAX.

1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of St. Tammany Parish, That besides the two-mill tax set aside for public road purposes, there is hereby levied for the year 1905, a per capita tax of \$1 upon each male inhabitant of the parish between the ages of 15 and 55 years, except parties who live in cities and towns that keep up their own streets; this tax to be collected as provided by law, and to be paid by the 31st of December, 1905, and each year thereafter; and that any person failing to pay his per capita tax as above levied shall be fined in the sum of not less than \$5 nor more than \$5, and in default of the payment of the fine and costs, he shall be sentenced to work on the public road for a period of not to exceed 30 days, at the discretion of the Court.

2. Be it further ordained, etc., That said prosecution shall be conducted before the District Court.

The St. Tammany Health Homes Cases.
 In the suit of the Poitevent & Favre Lumber Company against the St. Tammany Health Homes Company, Limited, filed some time since, praying that the defendant be directed by the Court to relinquish claim and title to certain lands in St. Tammany Parish because of violation of a contract entered into between the Poitevent & Favre Lumber Company, owner of said lands, and the St. Tammany Health Homes Company Limited, whereby the latter agreed to build on and improve the lands, a cross bill and an answer were presented by the defendant in the United States Court last week.

It is represented in the cross bill and answer that the defendant did not violate any contract, but, on the contrary, that the Poitevent & Favre Lumber Company has not given title to the defendant to lands which it had legally acquired, under the contract alluded to. Defendants ask that the plaintiffs give clear title to 2,500 acres.
