Aid, of American No. 19, of New Orleans. The newly installed officers of the local Grove are: Jno. W. Cundall, Jr. P. A.; Jno. L. Jenkins, Noble Arch; Dr. B. B. Warren, Vice Arch; F. B. After the installation ceremony the local and Grand Lodge representatives were photographed, after which they proceeded to Claiborne Cottage, where a banquet was served. Jno. L. Jenkins, Noble Arch, acted as toastmaster and called on the representatives of the Grand Lodge present to speak on some feature of their work. Arthur J. Peters, Noble Arch of the Druids of Louisiana, spoke of the phenomenal growth of the order in the State, how along every line there has been a constant advance; how every claim had been met promptly; how the spirit of fraternity had grown with the growth of the order from 1,700 to over 2,300 the past year. He declared that the order was daily ascending to a higher plane of membership. Several other Grand Lodge officers spoke of the growth of the local lodge in the past five years. In the past year the Bogue Falaya Grove has added considerably to its membership and promptly met all its claims. For the first time in its history death has invaded its ranks. Fish Law

In response to a number of inquiries, we publish the following extract from the Fish Law adopted by the Police Jury, July 27, 1903:

Sec. 1. That in order to protect the fish of the Parish it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell, or expose for sale, to exchange, or in any trade or traffic in the fresh water fish caught out of the streams, bayous or other water courses of this Parish.

Sec. 2. That this Ordinance does not apply to salt water fish, or Lake Pontchartrain, or fish brought from other portions of the State into this Parish.

FRANCHISE SECURED.

Baton Rouge La., June 8.—A meeting of the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Company and William C. Dufour, representing the Colorado Southern, New Orleans and Pacific railroads was held this morning at 9 o'clock at the Bank of Baton Rouge, at which time the deal for the franchise of the proposed road from Baton Rouge to the East was closed.

At a conference held this morning at 9 o'clock, at the Bank of Baton Rouge, between William C. Dufour, representing the Colorado Southern, New Orleans Pacific Railroad, and the Directors of the proposed Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad, the deal was closed by Mr. Dufour, as agent for the Colorado Southern concern, for the purchase of the rights, franchises, etc., of the road that is to be constructed between the Capital City and Hammond, provided that the people of the City of Baton Rouge vote the bonus for the construction of the road between De Quincy and this city.

The conference lasted about two hours and a half, and was participated in by R. A. Hart, Ben R. Mayer and D. M. Raymond, representing the Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Railroad, and Mr. Dufour representing the Colorado Southern, New Orleans and Pacific Railroad.

The interests back of the New Orleans Road agreed to take the franchises, rights of way—in fact, the entire assets of the Company—for \$7,500, the price at which the assets of the Road were first offered. The provision was made that the deal hinged on the voting of a bonus by this city for the construction of the Colorado Southern, New Orleans and Pacific Road from De Quincy to Baton Rouge.

The Baton Rouge, Hammond and Eastern Company now have secured the right of way from Hammond to the Parish of East Baton Rouge, and they promised to assist in securing the right of way through this parish and through the city, a distance of twenty miles. W. L. Stevens, a prominent planter, stated at the meeting that he would give the right of way through his place, a distance of two miles. This leaves only ten miles to be secured.

According to the present plans of the Frisco people work will begin both ways from Baton Rouge and at De Quincy and Hammond at the same time, and in this way the line can be completed in an unusually short time.

No definite plans have yet been made for building the line from Hammond to Covington, and the engineers that no right of way for this section has yet been secured. The Frisco has three surveying parties in the field at the present time between De Quincy and Baton Rouge, and plan are being made to add several more on June 15.

How It Happened.

The cardinal causes of Rojstvensky's defeat have been the subject of general discussion. One Japanese expert gives the following analysis:

"First—An imperfect reconnaissance and incomplete, faulty and misleading intelligence.

"Second—An imperfect battle formation, which indicated that Rojstvensky did not expect to meet Togo off Tushima.

"Third—The weather, the direction of the wind and sunlight were unfavorable to the Russians, Togo having the sun behind him and firing with the wind, while the Russians had the sunlight in their eyes and fired against the wind.

"Fourth—The Russians wasted their ammunition, and eventually ran short. It is believed that the surrender of Nebogatoff was necessary because his ammunition had been expended.

Fifth—The marked inferiority of the Russian gunners."

New Orleans, May 23, 1905.

Esteemed Comrades:

The Louisville and Nashville Railroad has been selected as the official route for the Louisiana Division to the reunion at Louisville, Ky., June 14th, 15th and 16th, 1905. The official train will leave the depot at the foot of Canal street, New Orleans, at 9:25 o'clock Tuesday morning June 13th, to reach Louisville at 8:20 the next morning. On its arrival the command will be met by Capt. W. B. Hamilton, the Chairman of the Louisiana Division, with a band of music, and escorted by him to the Louisiana Headquarters.

Tickets can be secured from most railroad stations in Louisiana to Louisville and return over the L. and N. Railroad, with stop-over at Mammoth Cave, if desired, via New Orleans, at the same rate as via any other route. The official train will be made up of first-class Pullman sleepers and chair cars. No extra charge for riding in chair cars.

Please inform us at as early a date as practicable how many will come from your camp or vicinity, and how much sleeping car space, if any, will be desired.

These cheap rates apply to the public generally, so that any person who desires to go to the Louisville reunion can go at reduced rates.

The rates at the Galb house is \$3.50 to \$4.00. At other hotels and private houses, \$2.50, all on American plan. Rooms can be had without board for \$1.00 per day.
