**Grand Jury.**

The Grand Jury met last Monday and adjourned Wednesday until Saturday. They returned 12 true bills, and made the following special report:

To the Honorable the Twenty-Sixth Judicial District Court of Louisiana, in and for the Parish of St. Tammany:

We, the undersigned members of the Grand Jury, sitting in regular session, beg leave of this Honorable Court, to submit the following special report:

Our attention has been called to a certain statement published in the Covington News, issue of April 27, 1905, a newspaper published in the town of Covington, this Parish and State, under the caption of the "District Court." Said statement or publication being as follows: "Strong indignation has been expressed toward the foreman about his bad and ugly advice given small boys who appeared before his body as witnesses. We do not charge the Grand Jury with neglect of duty in any case that came before them, yet we do condemn the practice of old grey-headed men, selected and sworn to investigate all violations of the State and Parish statutes, when he regards a case not sufficiently grave to warrant an indictment, to advise boys 12 or 15 years of age to go out and challenge grown men, and fight out their differences. Boys usually are disposed to seek revenge themselves, without being advised, as it were, from an august body to do so."

We desire to state that said publication is absolutely not in accord with facts in the case. And, whereas, we are prohibited under the law to divulge what transpired before the Grand Jury, we can say in a general way, that we emphatically deny that any advice was given by the foreman of the Grand Jury, or any member thereof, "to boys 12 or 15 years old to go out and challenge grown men, and fight out their differences."

Feeling that the statement contained in said publication is a reflection upon our integrity both as men and as Grand Jurors sworn to do our duty, and further realizing that this Honorable Court has a right to demand an explanation of the truthfulness or untruthfulness of the statements contained in the publication above referred to, we deemed it both wise and proper to make this special report in justice to this Honorable Court, in justice to ourselves and in justice to the public at large.

We, therefore, pray that your Honor will accept this special report and order the same spread upon the minutes of your Court.

As Mr. I. B. Wascum, who was at that time a member of this Grand Jury, but since then exonerated by the Court, and Mr. J. E. Blackwell substituted in his place, for that reason, not knowing personally the facts, has properly not signed this report. Respectfully submitted:
