CHARTER

—OF THE—
United Friends Christian A. B. A.,
Juvenile, Adults and Commanderies Combined.

STATE OF LOUISIANA,
Parish of St. Tammany,
Covington, La., April 22, 1905.

PERSONALLY CAME AND APPEARED, George Washington, Frank Sheridan, Joseph Abram, W. M. Bennett, T. H. Davis, Ephraim Brown and Rebecca Douglas, all residents of the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, who declared unto me, Notary, in the presence of the two undersigned witnesses, that desiring to avail themselves of the provisions of the law of this State relating to the formation of corporations for charitable purposes, and to acquire, and enjoy the rights, privileges and powers of the body corporate and politic in law, they do hereby form themselves into such a corporation and body politic under the name and style, and for the purposes herein after specially set forth, viz:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation and association shall be the UNITED FRIENDS CHRISTIAN A. B. A., JUVENILE, ADULTS AND COMMANDERIES COMBINED.

ARTICLE II.

The objects and purposes of this corporation and association are to give mutual aid and assistance to each other, in other words, organized for benevolent and charitable purposes.

ARTICLE III.

Under the above entitled name, and for the purpose above expressed, the said corporation shall have the power and authority to make, have and use a common seal, with such device and inscription as they shall deem proper, and the same to break, alter and amend at their pleasure, and by the name and style and title provided and declared aforesaid, shall be capable in law to sue and be sued, and shall be empowered to make rules, by-laws and ordinances and do everything needful for their good government and support, and shall be and is empowered to take, have and hold all manner of lands, rents and any sum of money, any manner and portion of goods and chattels given unto it or acquired by it in any manner.

ARTICLE IV.

The domicile of this association and corporation shall be and is hereby fixed at Pine Grove, Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana.

The officers of this corporation shall be a President, Vice President, Financial Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Chaplain, Grand Marshal and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the members of this corporation, on or before the second Monday of April, and who shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified, and said officers shall constitute the Board of Directors of this corporation and association, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Said officers shall have the power and authority which usually belongs to their respective positions. Until the election above provided for, which shall be held on the 2nd Monday of April each year, George Washington shall be the President of this corporation, Frank Sheridan shall be Vice President, W. M. Bennett shall be Corresponding Secretary, Dicy Wicker shall be Financial Secretary, Joseph Abram Treasurer, Ephraim Brown shall be Chaplain, and T. H. Davis shall be Grand Marshal, which said officers shall constitute the Board of Directors of this association and corporation as above provided.

ARTICLE V.

The President of this association, and in his absence the Vice President, is hereby designated as the officer upon whom citation shall be served. This corporation and association shall exist and continue for the period of ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved by a vote of two thirds of the entire members, at a meeting specially called for that purpose, after ten days public notice. In case of such a vote dissolving this corporation, the said meeting shall at the same time that such a vote may be taken elect three liquidators to settle and wind up affairs.

ARTICLE VI.

The Board of Directors may adopt such by-laws, rules and regulations for the government of this corporation and association as they may deem proper, subject to the approval of the members of said association. In testimony whereof the said parties have hereunto affixed their signatures, together with me, Notary, and subscribing competent witnesses on the day and date first above written, and after reading of the whole.
