RAILROAD MEETING.

A chair made by Confederates during the siege of Port Hudson by the Federals and used by General Gardner, commander of the garrison, has fallen to R. J. Hummel, of Baton Rouge, and will be presented by him to the State Historical Society. The chair is plain and made of wood, with a rawhide bottom. After the war the chair came into the possession of Will Miller, of Port Hudson, who served with General Gardner during the siege. Before Mr. Miller died he gave the relic to Mr. Hummel, but it has been in care of the Miller family.

We have in our office a chair similar to the one above described. It was made by the late J. E. Smith, Sr., who was postmaster and merchant at Sun Postoffice, during the early 60's. The chair is still in first-class condition, and good for many more years of active service. It is a comfortable reminder of "the times that tried men's souls."

DIED.—In Covington, La., Wednesday, July 5, 1905, at 5 p. m., Clothilde C. Lacroix, relict of the late Pierre Laborde, a native of Bordeaux, France, aged 66 years and 3 months.

The deceased was one of the oldest residents of Covington, and was widely known throughout the parish, having been engaged in merchandising here for a number of years, and was universally esteemed for her fine qualities of mind and heart, being always ready to assist the sick and distressed. She had been sick for several months, and her death was not unexpected, but is of universal regret.
