How An Old-Time Lawyer Got An Acquittal.

"Old-time lawyers in our State still recount with glee how a shrewd member of the bar saved a client from the penitentiary," said M. W. Hastings, of Alabama.

"This lawyer had been employed by a tough citizen to defend him on a charge of horse stealing. The State had a strong case, and it looked as though with such positive proof the accused was certain to go behind the bars. Now at that period the law was such that a man could only be tried on an original indictment; in other words, if an indictment was lost or destroyed the result was the same as an acquittal. Desperate conditions require desperate remedies, and what does this lawyer for the defense do after making a pretext of wishing to examine the document but sit there in the courtroom and deliberately chew up the indictment and swallow the fragments. He did this just as truly as 'Eat 'Em Up Jake' chewed and swallowed a sixth card in a poker game, which every sport in the United States knows that he did.

"And this was the cause of a change in the Statutes in Alabama, whereby a new or substitute indictment can be got and held as valid in case of the disappearance of the original."

Sir James Sawyer, an English physician, has formulated the following nineteen rules for prolonging life to 100 years:

1. Eight hours' sleep.

In the Choctaw Indian language there is a word "okeh," which means, "it is correct," or "I agree or approve." It is often used alone to give assent or approval to a suggestion or proposal. "Okeh" was in common use among whites who had dealings with the Choctaws more than thirty years before the Van Buren campaign. It was a very convenient expression where parties understood each other's language perfectly, and was used to mean, "I understood you and approve of what you say," or "I understood your statement and vouch for its correctness." There being no English word or expression so brief or exact, "okeh" spelled phonetically, "O. K." came into common use among the whites; and chiefly, perhaps, through its use by transportation companies it has come into general use.


