Summer Normal.

The Normal School for this section of the State opened at the Pavilion, in Covington, last Monday, with a very good attendance, which has been increasing steadily during the week.

The Faculty consists of Prof. Geo. W. Reid, Conductor; Miss Martha Shea, Miss Margaret E. Cross, of New Orleans; Miss Augusta Melkin and Miss Francis Church of Chicago, all being members of the Faculty of the State Normal at Natchitoches. Prof. J. E. Keeny, of Natchitoches, spent Monday here, but was unable to prolong his stay, much to the regret of the Faculty and visiting teachers.

District Attorney Joseph B. Lancaster, former Parish Superintendent of Education, delivered an interesting address, appropriate to the occasion, and on Tuesday night State Superintendent of Public Education J. B. Aswell delivered a highly interesting lecture which was listened to by a large and appreciative audience.

A capable Faculty has been provided, and the school will be conducted along new lines, enabling each teacher to select such subjects as will best prepare him or her for a special line of school work for the future. No teacher in this section should fail to attend this school, and thereby gain the benefits to be derived from a month of faithful effort in professional improvement. Those who attend will be allowed credit on their examination for certificates, and, under the law, will be given a preference when teachers are selected for the schools.

Mr. A. W. Crandall, the Register of the State Land Office, is sending out circulars calling the attention of people to the provisions of Act No. 113 of the General Assembly of 1904. Improved Railway Service.

The new train service on the East Louisiana Railway was inaugurated last Monday, by the installation of a passenger train known as No. 6, which is run from Pearl River to Covington, connecting at Pearl River with the train which leaves New Orleans at 6:30 A. M. This train reaches Covington at 8:37 A. M. instead of 9:25 A. M., as previously. On the return trip it will leave here at 2:41 P. M. and reaches New Orleans at 4:45 P. M.

This will give about three hours more between trains here than formerly. This train is a full passenger train, being composed of a combination car and two passenger coaches, and drawn by one of the light engines that have been employed on the St. Tammany Special. The freight train, which formerly gave the service, will run on the same schedule, but carry no passengers. This new train brings the mail from two to three hours earlier than formerly.

It is stated that at an early date this service will be extended to Folsom, which point will be reached at 10 o'clock A. M., and returning leave Folsom at 1:15 P. M. This train will in no way interfere with the St. Tammany Special. It will continue its regular schedule.
