Deputy Sheriff Eugene Badon, of Slidell, visited Covington last Wednesday, and informed us that Slidell was perfectly healthy, and crowded with summer visitors from the city, until very few if any more could be accommodated. He brought in two prisoners, Nora Emmerson and Harry Wright, colored, and placed them in the parish jail, charged with wounding and cutting with a dangerous weapon.

W. D. Turner, of Laurel, was fined twenty-five dollars for telling a yellow fever "joke" as he called it, but the Mayor decided it was no time for that particular kind of jokes, and hence he imposed the fine as above stated. That is the same penalty fixed by the Town Council of Covington for a similar offense.

The Pavilion is entirely too small for entertainments, and is not fitted up for the purpose. Besides, on occasions such as those of last week, when the hall was overcrowded, if a stampede had been caused by a cry of fire, many would have been injured, and perhaps some killed, in the rush for the door. Let us have an opera house of modern design, by all means, and the sooner the better.
