Bare Lots For Lambs.

The Agricultural Experiment Station of the Louisiana State University and Agricultural and Mechanical College has issued a bulletin on the results of raising lambs by the "bare lot" method. The bulletin, prepared by Dr. W. D. Dalrymple, shows the results of the experiments in eliminating nodular disease of the intestines of sheep by raising lambs on ground bare of grass. The bulletin says that experiments previously undertaken went to show that when sheep suffering from this disease were placed upon a clean pasture and allowed to remain upon it for some time they became contaminated with this disease, as was afterwards proved by the fact that clean lambs, when permitted to occupy the pasture, contracted the disease, while other lambs, born and raised under similar conditions, but not placed on the pasture, did not become affected. The fact having been proved that the parasite which causes the disease evidently passes from the diseased ewe to the pasture, and subsequently picked up by the lambs while grazing, the department turned its attention towards some method by which the lambs could be raised and escape the infection. The experiments with the "bare lot" system have proven a success. No grass was left upon the lot from which the lamb could graze, and concentrated food, such as oats, bran and crushed grains were fed out of a wooden trough. The lambs raised by this method were not affected with the disease.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of the town of Covington, Louisiana, That all privy vaults, cess-pools, yards, lots and premises, shall be cleaned and kept in a sanitary condition.
 Section 2. That all privy vaults and cess-pools shall be disinfected with lime or some other disinfectant, at least once every seven (7) days.
 Section 3. That the Town Marshal and his assistant are hereby authorized and empowered to enter the premises of any person or persons within the corporate limits of the Town of Covington, for the purpose of investigating the sanitary conditions of his or her property, and if, after such investigation, the Town Marshal or his assistant find said premises in an unsanitary state, he shall by notice in writing served upon the owner or agent of any such property by leaving same with such owner or agent at his residence or place of business, require such owner or agent to cause such property to be put in a sanitary condition within five (5) days after such notice.
 Section 4. Whoever shall violate the provisions of this resolution shall be subject to a fine not to exceed twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, or imprisonment in the town jail for a term not to exceed thirty (30) days or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.
 Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its passage.
 Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That all provisions inconsistent with or contrary to this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the Town Council of Covington, Louisiana, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep on his or her premises water in any barrel, bucket, pool, hole, cistern, tank, trough or any other receptacle of water, for a greater period than two (2) days, except under the following conditions, to-wit:
 Section 1. Be it further ordained, etc., That water in pools, troughs, ponds, holes and buckets shall be drained at least every week, or be covered with coal oil.
 Section 2. All cisterns and tanks in which water is kept for a greater period than seven (7) days shall be provided with a cover

of wood or metal.
 And air holes in all cisterns and tanks shall be screened with wire, not less than sixteen (16) mesh, in such a manner as to prevent the entrance or exit of mosquitoes.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That whoever shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), or imprisonment in the town jail for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days or both, at the discretion of the Mayor.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its passage.
 Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That all ordinances inconsistent with or contrary to this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE.

Section 1: Be it ordained, by the Council of the Town of Covington, La., That no building shall be erected, or its erection commenced, or any alterations made in any building already erected, or hereafter to be erected, when such building or repairs shall cost more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, unless the plans and specifications or a copy thereof with the contract cost of such building, or alteration, shall have first been submitted to the Improvement Committee, and a certificate of approval and a permit granted by them therefor.
 It shall be the duty of the Improvement Committee, without unreasonable delay, to issue such certificate, when such plans and specifications conform to this ordinance. All plans submitted for approval, whether for alterations or new buildings, must be drawn to a proper scale in a legible manner and show foundations, fronts and side elevations, and all upper walls and all roof plans, chimneys, flues, columns and supports, as are intended to be used, and such other sections and elevations as may be required to clearly indicate and represent the construction of the proposed work. No plans will be considered unless accompanied by the specifications, and such specifications must be written in a legible manner, and must conform strictly with the law and with the plans accompanying them, and must have the names and residences of the owner, or owners, architect and builder or contractor, and must set forth clearly and fully the location of the building to be erected, or the building whereupon alterations are to be made.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., Whoever shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and such offender shall be subject to a fine not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, for each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance, and each day's persistence in said violation shall constitute a new offense.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its passage.
 Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that all laws or parts of laws in conflict with the foregoing ordinance are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the Town of Covington, That it shall not be lawful to erect, and all persons are forbidden to erect or cause to be erected, within the following described limits, any building whatever, except the walls thereof be constructed of brick or other non-combustible material, covered with slates or other non-combustible materials, viz:
 From the corner of Rutland and Columbia streets, down Rutland street to the corner of New Hampshire street and running back one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the front of either side of said Rutland street, thence from the corner of New Hampshire and Rutland streets down New Hampshire street to the corner of Lockwood street and running back one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the front of either side of said Rutland street, thence down Lockwood street to the corner of Columbia street and running back one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the front of either side of said Columbia street one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the corner of Columbia and Boston streets down to the corner of New Hampshire street and running back one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the front of either side of said Boston street, and from the corner of Columbia and Gibson streets down to the corner of New Hampshire street and running back one hundred and eighty (180) feet from the front of either side of said Gibson street one hundred and eighty (180) feet.
 Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That it shall be unlawful to erect, and all persons are forbidden to erect, or cause to be erected, within the corporate limits of the Town of Covington, any building to be used as a bank or hotel or grocery store or drug store or general store, or as a place of deposit except the walls thereof be constructed of brick or other non-combustible materials, covered with slates or other non-combustible materials.
 Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That it shall be lawful to repair the roof of any building, or cause the same to be done, within the limits described in section 1 of this ordinance, except by using in such repairs non-combustible materials.
 Section 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That it shall not be lawful, and all persons are forbidden to increase or add to the dimensions of any building already erected under the pretense of repairing, or cause the same to be done, within the limits described in section 1 of this ordinance.
 Section 5. Be it further ordained, etc., Whoever shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine not less than five (\$5.00) dollars, nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars, for each and every week, he, she or they shall refuse or neglect to comply with a written notice from the Mayor, specifying the time within which he, she or they shall be given to demolish or alter any such building erected or repaired in contravention of the provisions of this ordinance.
 Section 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall go into effect from and after its passage.
 Section 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That all laws or parts of laws in conflict with the foregoing ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.
