Owing to the interruption of travel, caused by quarantines, the opening session of the Louisiana State University, at Baton Rouge, has been postponed till Wednesday, October 18.

The movement to erect a colored public school building is progressing. The lot has been purchased and subscriptions are being freely made for the cause.

The Russian and Japanese envoys have perfected an arrangement to end the war, and the details are being drawn up. It is said to be a diplomatic victory for Russia, but a great moral victory for the Japs.

We are pleased to make this correction, and hope he will continue to retain his present good health and genial spirit.

Our citizens were naturally indignant last Sunday, when it was learned that some persons had posted a notice in the postoffice, at Franklinton, to the effect that there was a case of yellow fever in Covington. There is a strict law and severe penalty for maliciously and slanderously circulating false reports of this nature, and unless the practice is discontinued, the perpetrators will be criminally prosecuted.

The editor and wife spent a pleasant time at Abita Springs last Sunday evening. Of course we walked "around the belt," and noticed that the popular Long Branch Hotel and Mutti Hotel were well filled with contented and happy guests, enjoying the cool evening breeze under the shade of the giant oaks.
