\$6 25 per lineal foot.

The Bullen Bridge Co., Birm-  
ingham, Ala., \$1715, and ap-  
proaches, \$5 50 per lineal foot.

proposed location of the bridge,  
for further investigation.

J. H. Parker Killed

News was received here of the  
killing of Joseph H. Parker, a  
prominently connected young man  
of the Parker neighborhood, on  
Talisheek. The killing occurred  
about thirteen miles north of Cov-  
ington, on the Pearl River road,  
and although Parker was last seen  
Sunday night at 7:30 o'clock, his  
body was not discovered until 4  
o'clock Monday afternoon. Sheriff  
F. E. Brewster and the Coroner,  
Dr. F. G. Marero, left for the  
scene of the killing to make an in-  
vestigation. The coroner viewed  
the body and the inquest was con-  
tinued until Saturday, September  
16.
