There are about a dozen prisoners in the Parish Jail, awaiting trial by the Court, which will convene on Monday, October 9.

The town authorities are having piling driven, and a substantial cribbing will be built on the square leading to the new steel bridge.

The small boys are now assembling all over the country to show their teachers the new tricks they have learned during the vacation.

The earliest frost occurred October 22, 1898, and the earliest killing frost Nov. 11, 1877. This is dating from 1873 and occurring in Louisiana.

Mrs. W. A. Thomas, Mrs. J. J. Thomas and Mrs. R. M. Chisholm and daughter Genevieve are among the guests of Mrs. W. N. Patrick, at Oak Grove Cottage.

Dixon Academy, a model boarding school for boys, will re-open next Monday, October 2, with a large attendance and a complete faculty in all branches of study.

Pierre Blanc, a former merchant and well-known citizen, died last Tuesday, aged 45 years. He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Emma Duffel, and one child.

Frederick William Begel, one of the oldest residents of Covington, died last Thursday morning, at 10:30 o'clock, aged 94 years, 10 months and 27 days. He was a native of Kraden, Germany.

We are pleased to learn that our popular young townsman, Mr. Charlie Weaver, who has been in the city a couple of weeks under treatment for an affection of the nerves, is getting along nicely, and we hope he will soon be restored to perfect health.

Our summer visitors are rapidly returning to the city. They have enjoyed their sojourn in Covington, free of all quarantine restrictions, and have no fear of returning to their homes, which proves they have faith in the healthfulness of the city, regardless of the existence of a few cases of yellow fever.

The experience of the past summer season clearly demonstrated that there is a growing demand in Covington for more houses to rent. Many applicants returned to the city because they could not be accommodated. Our capitalists should see that this does not occur in the future.

Mr. Adolph Courtney, aged 27 years, died last Thursday evening of abscess of the liver, after several weeks illness. He was a clerk in the store of Babington-Thomas Co., and had many friends, who sincerely regret his untimely death. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Courtney, who now reside in Hattiesburg, Miss.

August Celestin, a negro, was murdered in Mandeville early last Thursday morning. He was beaten and shot by William Hart, a negro. The men had a quarrel at the foot of the new Camelie wharf, and Hart used his pistol. Hart escaped but it is believed he will be captured soon.

Abe Bickham, colored, shot and killed Lucy Watkins, last Sunday night. We learn from reports that he killed her because she insisted on going to church, against his will. Bickham made his escape, but will no doubt be apprehended in a short time.

With the bride standing in Lincoln County, the groom in Amite County and the minister in Pike County, Miss Sarah Adams and Aubrey Toler were married in the open air, at Auburn, Miss., last Wednesday, this arrangement being necessary because of the quarantines.

The grand entertainment and musical and dramatic recital which was to be given at Conrad's Hall, Abita Springs, last Thursday night, by Miss Marie Evans, a talented and versatile artist, assisted by local performers, has been postponed until next Tuesday night, Oct. 3, on account of the inclement weather. Tickets sold will be good for that night.

The fine cottage belonging to Mrs. Engelhardt, on the west side of Simpson's branch, was destroyed by fire last Friday afternoon, including the contents. No insurance. In order to exercise your franchise at the polls in the election to be held in 1906 it is necessary to have paid your poll tax for 1905.

This tax is applied solely for the support and benefit of the public schools, and it behooves every voter to pay his poll tax at once, as well as to see that his neighbor also pays his.

As we have remarked on several occasions, Covington needs and should have a town hall. We have the ground, on the site of the old town hall, fenced in and paved. It is a central location, being only half a square from the main business street, and a well-fitted hall, with seating capacity for about 800, would be an acquisition as well as an ornament to our town. We hope to see the project carried out some time in the near future. It could be made a two or three-story building, with a public market in the lower story.

The public schools of the parish will open next Monday, October 2. The Parish Superintendent, W. G. Evans, has appointed Prof. F. W. Tubbs, of Oneonta, N. Y., to be Principal of the Covington High School, Prof. R. G. Corkern, of Franklinton, Principal of Shidell High School, and Mrs. J. M. Sharp, of Mandeville, to take charge of the Lewisburg School. It is proposed to run a high school term one year, and if the attendance justifies it, to continue the term a second year, giving pupils the advantage of the higher grade. Parents are cordially invited to be present at the opening of the schools.

The wedding presents were numerous and handsome.

The happy couple arrived in Covington Tuesday, where they received a hearty welcome, and they have the congratulations and best wishes of a large circle of friends for their future happiness and prosperity.

The residence of Mrs. N. Seiler, in New Covington, was struck by lightning early Friday morning. Mr. Seafred Neuhans, aged 20 years, died of yellow fever in New Orleans last Wednesday. His uncle, Bernard Hess, says he contracted the disease either in Abita Springs or Covington, as he had not been in the city since August 5th. This must be a mistake, as there has been no yellow fever in either place.

A practical illustration of the senseless quarantine, for it can be called by no other name, is shown in the case of Mrs. Molen, of Natchitoches. She went to New Orleans recently on business, and was nowhere near infected points. But when she returned to Natchitoches, she was informed that she would have to go to Hammond and stay five days before she would be allowed to stay at Natchitoches. They also agreed to pay her board while here. Natchitoches is supposed to be quarantined against all infected points, and all points not quarantined against New Orleans. So they had to right sending Mrs. Molen to Hammond, without violating their own quarantine rules. Natchitoches people frequently come here, then why quarantine against Hammond? Mrs. Molen is now boarding at Hammond Hotel, when she might just as well be at home running her own boarding house.—Hammond Vindicator.
