The first communicants of this and of last year and other persons to be confirmed, will go to confession in the morning, and go to communion at the 8 o'clock mass in their respective churches, at Covington, Abita Springs or Madisonville. Those of Abita Springs can come to Covington on the excursion train, and those of Madisonville, like in former years, on a covered flat with dog box.

The same day, at 3 p. m. the Right Rev. Bishop will give confirmation in the church of Mandeville to a number of persons of Mandeville, Bayou LaCrosse and other parts of the Parish.

Triumph of Science

Encouraging Reports of Work of Hospital Service

The New York Globe, in an editorial under the caption of "A Triumph of Science" says:

Most encouraging are the dispatches from New Orleans telling of the awakening of the people in the South to the advantage of modern scientific methods of dealing with yellow fever. At the outbreak of the fever many people called in alarm for the old-fashioned drastic quarantine measures and scoffed at every suggestion of innovations suggested by laboratory investigation. Especially derided by them was the theory of dissemination of the disease by mosquitoes, and every attempt to suppress these dangerous pests as a sanitary precaution was condemned as an evidence of official incompetence or worse.

Fortunately all the authorities were not deterred by the clamor from doing what they knew to be right. In many of the infested districts the recommendations of the United States Marine Hospital Service for the destruction of the disease carriers were vigorously carried out, and with good results. In other places, on the other hand, where local opposition to the work of mosquito destruction was not overcome, the fever made alarming headway.

Such a practical demonstration has naturally been effective. Already many mayors of Southern towns and cities have joined in the movement for federal quarantine and the adoption of the Hospital Service methods, and there is no longer much doubt that the obstacles of local jealousy which has hitherto stood in the way of enlightened federal supervision will soon be overcome throughout the States which are subject to yellow fever contamination. Such a consummation will be a distinct triumph for applied science, whose victories, fortunately for mankind, are steadily increasing.
