

ORDER OF ELECTION

Whereas, The Mayor and Council of the Town of Covington did, as a regular meeting held on the 4th day of October, 1905, ordain that a special election be held in said Town of Covington on Tuesday, the 14th day of November, 1905, and did request the Board of Supervisors for the Parish of St. Tammany to supervise said election, to appoint commissioners and clerks to serve at said election, and to give due notice of said appointments, and of the time and place of holding said election, and to make return of the result of said election to said Mayor and Council.
Now, therefore, we, the Board of Supervisors of Election in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned, sworn and qualified, by virtue of the authority in us vested, and pursuant to the request aforesaid, do hereby give public notice that on Tuesday, the 14th day of November, 1905, a special election will be held at the Court house in said Town of Covington for the purpose of taking the census of the property tax payers of the Town of Covington entitled to vote under the constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana upon the question of levying a special tax of five mills on the dollar per annum, or as much the most as may be necessary, for a period of ten years, beginning with the year 1907, for the purpose of raising the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) in each of said years, or so much less as tax of five mills on the dollar will produce, not to exceed the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars in each year.

THE UPPER AIR.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE DEAD SILENCE THERE.

The recent balloon voyage of two Englishmen in the Vivienne III, when they ran a race in the air from Liege, Belgium, was one of the highest on record, the altitude maintained being three miles, says the London Express.

"It was dry when we started," said one of the aeronauts, Stanley Spencer, "but when we had reached the height of 3,000 feet rain began to fall heavily, sounding like the rattle of bullets on the case of the balloon. At 9,000 feet, however, we got above the clouds and out of the rain. Here the velocity of the wind was much greater, and we found that the higher we ascended the greater was the wind force, until at our highest point—three miles, which was reached after the sacrifice of a great deal of ballast—it was blowing nearly fifty miles an hour.

The effect of the clouds below us as we ascended in the brilliant sunshine was marvellous. They stretched away as far as the eye could see, a striking panorama of snow white billows. Far above us, again, was an other stratum of clouds, of soft, fleecy appearance."

The coldest part of the ascent was when they were passing through the masses of clouds, but as they got higher into the direct rays of the bright sunshine it became much warmer, so that they were again able to throw off their fur coats.

As the balloon passed from one fiercely blowing current of wind in the opposite, the shock was such that the balloon swayed violently, and it seemed as though the car must be overturned.

"As we were rushing along the silence was intense," continued Mr. Spencer, "but as we passed over the iron works districts of Belgium and Germany we could distinctly hear the peculiar roar of the blast furnaces, and the clanging of the steam hammers, although we were three miles above them. For the first time in the history of ballooning we were able to enjoy hot food and drinks on this trip. We took up with us tins of prepared coffee, soups and meats, which by chemical preparation in tins, can be heated simply by admitting the air through holes made in an outer case."
